## FACTS AND FIGURES

Australia's exports of wool to the United States have doubled within a year.

The total number of passengers carried by electric lines each year in the United States is 5,536,000,000.

The recent birth rate for St. George's in the East, London, the headquarters of the alien invasion, is at the rate of 62.8 per 1,000. This is the highest birth rate ever recorded in England.

In spite of the many jokes that are made at the expense of the Georgia peach crop, that state produced more peaches than any of the eastern states. It is said that there are over 7,000,000 trees that bear peaches in the state.

Benches to the number of 3,128 were shipped from Alaska last season. An industry pursued incidentally with that of sealing on the Pribiloff islands is that of raising the blue fox for its pelt. The animals, under the system in use, are fed and cared for as if domesticated.

It is said that the biggest shell ever made was turned out by the Krupp people at Essen, Germany. It was made for Russia, and weighed 2,550 pounds. The gun which is large enough to use this shell is mounted on the fortifications at Cronstadt, and has a range of 12 miles. Each time that it is fired it costs the czar \$1,500.

In the last nine years 51,000 motors have been registered in England. Of these 2,500 have been used for commercial purposes. The motor-wagon users have formed an association and it has issued a circular in which it is urged that commercial automobilism, if general, would reduce the cost of keeping up the roads and streets, lessen the blocking of the streets by congested traffic and make them less dangerous to pedestrians.

The 5,533 firms of brewers in the United Kingdom last year brewed 36,445,677 barrels of beer and upon this they paid \$13,552,821 duty to a national exchequer. According to a parliamentary return there is only one firm of brewers which has an annual output of over 2,000,000 barrels. This firm alone used 6,293,563 pounds of hops and 1,559,718 bushels of malt while its payment in duty amounted to £322,614 1 shilling and 6 pence.

## OLD-WORLD CDDITIES

Although roasted whole for 12 hours over coke fires, a Lulloek, cut up and distributed among 500 poor people at Sunderland, was found to be still uncooked.

During the hearing of a case at Highgate police court it was stated that 12 persons were living free of rent in Sydney Road, Hornsey, because no landlord ever called to collect it.

Along the coasts made in London by Farrey and Alexander was a well-known "musical entertainer" Quenton Ashlyn, who has decided that he cannot conscientiously continue in his profession.

"An aged Korean councillor of state, who is a strong reformer, Mr. Choi Ik Yen, has been sitting outside the palace gate at Seoul for five days," says a Japanese newspaper. "He proposes to sit there until the needed reforms are carried out."

Life saving runs in the family of Mr. J. Parsons, a young lighterman of the Hollows, Brentford, England, who, on his twenty-third birthday, received the Royal Humane society's certificate for rescuing two boys from drowning. His father saved 48 persons from drowning, and the son now has a total of 23 lives to his credit.

A short time ago, at Camberwell (Eng.) registry office, a well-dressed old gentleman, wearing a Panama hat and who gave his age as 75, was married to a young girl who has just passed her seventeenth year. After the ceremony a son of the old gentleman who will be 50 in a few days, went through the form of marriage with a lady who is in her sixty-eighth year. Leaving the office together, both the happy couples entered a motor car that was in waiting and drove away.
