### DAIRY DOINGS

Yonma valley farmers are harvesting an unusually large crop of grain this year, especially of oats and wheat. The hay harvest is about completed, and many are nearly through with their harvest also. As soon as the pressure for help is over threshing will begin.

The revival meetings still continue at Dairy. Nearly thirty converts are reported. Baptismal services will be held next Sunday at Bonanza.

In view of the apparent scarcity of labor to be had to work on the irrigation canals it is reported that some of the chosen delegates to the approaching National Irrigation congress, to be held at Boise, Idaho, soon, are in favor of proposing a resolution for the free admission of Mongolian labor to work on these canals. I have been to some pains to ascertain what the sentiments of the people hereabouts are respecting such a proposal, and, as far as I can learn, nearly everybody is opposed to the project. "Better submit to the necessary delay," was the expression of several.

"If the door to Chinese labor is opened on such a pretext there can be no protection for American labor for the future. We can stand an influx of labor from Europe without alarm, because such labor soon assimilates with our own working people, but the Chinks never do. They come here to make a stake, and then return to their native country to live on their scant savings—buying nothing beyond absolute necessities from the home merchants, dealing with the Six Companies in San Francisco and Portland in general. Their injection into the labor problem of this country would inevitably reduce our native laborers to a condition of absolute want and dependent poverty. A very few contractors might be temporarily benefitted, but the merchant, the mechanic and professional classes would be injured. Such a consummation would be an unspeakable calamity to our country. Whoever makes such a proposition would soon realize that he had made the mistake of his life. If American labor is scarce and wages are high, it is the very best sign of prosperity in the country, and to produce that condition is the aim of social conditions. The higher the wages better the chances for men to become home-owners and home-builders—adding to the responsibilities and bettering the condition of citizenship, and enlarging the benefits of American civilization generally."

Such are some of the arguments I hear advanced against the proposition. "Better throw your tariff laws to the dogs at once," said one. "With a horde of Chinese swarming into our country, to beat down the price of labor, would simply be suicidal," said another. "It would soon bring on the hardest times we ever saw."

Mrs. Peterstein has bargained to sell her place, two miles east of Dairy, to one of the Portland excursionists, so it is reported. About \$19 an acre is the price agreed on. When the sale is completed the lady expects to go to Germany for a visit to the home of her childhood and youth.

### A Wise Modern State

Australia, under its constitution, is governed by a responsible ministry beneath the shadowy figure of a powerless governor-general representing the forgotten crown and flimsy figment of British supervision. At the head of the government is the premier, who is the leader of the party that secures a working majority in parliament. Six states, New South Wales, Victoria, Queensland, South Australia, Western Australia and Tasmania, constitute the Commonwealth. In the lower house, representation is on the basis of population; in the Senate, or upper house, each state has six members. Lower house members are elected for three years, senators for six years, but senators' terms are so arranged that half the Senate must be elected every three years. Taught by our misfortunes the framers of the Australian constitution ordained the choice of their senators by popular vote and put it out of the power of their Supreme Court to become a third legislative body greater than the nation.—Charles Edward Russell in "Soldiers of the Common Good" in Everybody's Magazine for September.
