KLAMATH LAKE RAILROAD

Schedule of Freight Rates in Effect Sept. 1, 1906

All freight, regardless of classifica-
tion, in either direction, between Thrall,
Cal., and Pokagama, Ore., in less than
carload lots, 35 cents per cwt. On all
carload lots, regardless of classification,
in either direction, between the above
terminals, 25 cents per cwt.

All freight, regardless of classifica-
tion, in either direction, to intermediate
points between Thrall and Pokagama,
25 cents per 100 lbs.

All freight consigned to intermediate
points between Thrall and Pokagama
must be prepaid, as there are no agents.

On dry lumber in carload lots from all
points to Thrall, minimum 30,000 lbs.,
\$2 per thousand feet, board measure.

Except, towit: That all freight, such
as dynamite, powder and all other arti-
cles taking, under the Western classifica-
tion, a higher rate than first-class, the
above-mentioned rate of 35 cents per
100 lbs. between terminals, and 25 cents
per 100 lbs. for intermediate points, will
be doubled, trebled, etc., as the case
may be, on same basis as applied by the
Southern Pacific Railway Company. No
shipment less than 25 cents.

Demurrage, Storage and Forwarding Charges

At Thrall, Cal., the rates for storage as
accepted by the Southern Pacific Com-
pany will govern.

At Pokagama, Ore., freight will be
stored a reasonable time without charge.
In no case will any charge be made for
storage until after the consignee has
been duly notified that after a fixed date
storage charges will accrue. If storage
is charged the rate will be one cent per
100 lbs. for each day that said freight
remains in warehouse.

Demurrage charges at Thrall, Cal.,
will be the same as those charged by
the Southern Pacific Railway Company.

At Pokagama, Ore., a demurrage
charge of one dollar per day will be
made after three days that carlots re-
main unloaded; said three days to date
from receipt of notice by consignee that
cars are on the track.

Car-load lots of sugar, salt, cement,
nails, fence wire and general merchan-
dise will be unloaded at Pokagama by
the Railroad Company free of charge.
Heavy machinery, castings, boilers and
engines, which cannot be conveniently
handled or stored on the platform or in
the warehouse at Pokagama, will be
unloaded by consignees on the team
track. At the request of consignees
same will be unloaded by the Railroad
Company at the net cost thereof, same
not to exceed in any case, \$5 per car.

When beer in bulk, meaning in bar-
rels (not in bottles) is shipped over the
Klamath Lake Railroad from Thrall to
Pokagama, the empty barrels will be
delivered from Pokagama to Thrall free
of charge.

Upon request of consignees, freight
will be forwarded to points east of Po-
kagama by first responsible freighter
who will take the same, free of charge
by the railroad company. In other
words, no forwarding charges will be
made.

Rules and Rates Regarding Baggage

One hundred and fifty pounds of bag-
gage will be carried on each full ticket
and 75 pounds on each half ticket, free
of charge. Excess over 150 lbs will be
charged for at the rate of 60 cents per
100 lbs. or fraction thereof, regardless
of distance. No excess charge less
than 25 cents and no single piece carried
which weighs more than 250 lbs.

Baggage will be stored at Thrall, Cal.,
at the rates charged by the Southern
Pacific Railway Company.

At Pokagama, Ore., same will be
stored forty-eight hours free. After
said forty-eight hours rates for storage
will be the same as charged by the
Southern Pacific Company at Thrall,
Cal.

No baggage except hand baggage
will be carried unless checked.

Dogs will only be carried in baggage
compartments, and for their trouble
with same, conductors will collect and
retain 25 cents for each one carried,
regardless of distance.

Passengers will procure tickets at
Thrall and Pokagama before boarding
the train.

Conductors will collect ten cents in
addition to above fares from passen-
gers who do not procure tickets at
terminals where tickets are sold.

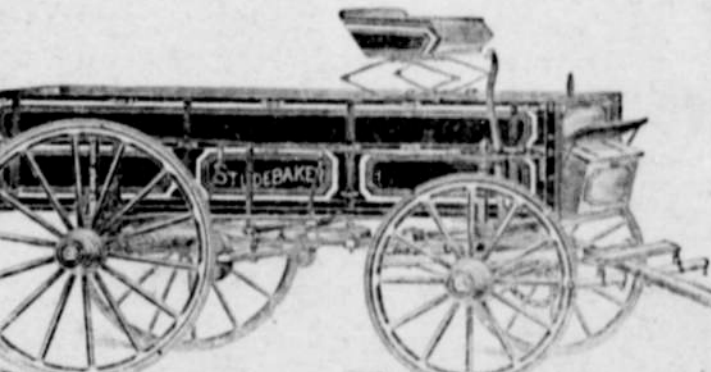
