Chief Engineer Graham and crew of assistants, who have been running the preliminary line for the Oregon Eastern, have been ordered to San Francisco, and left for there this week, by way of California-Northeastern.

George S. Long, vice president of the Klamath Lake railroad and the Weyerhaeuser Lumber company, arrived in this city Saturday. His presence here at this time is due to business connected with the interests of the companies of which he is an official.

John Fritz, who was taken in custody by the Sheriff is still confined in the county jail, some doubt being entertained as to his sanity by County Health Officer Mafton. If no improvement is manifested, he will be sent to the asylum in Salem.

Block 71, 72, 73, 86 and 87, located in the Klamath addition to this city, were sold by Sheriff Obenchain last Saturday to satisfy a judgement for \$8,500 held by Israel Katz of Port Townsend, Washington. It is the culmination of a great deal of litigation, and has been in the courts for a number of years. Mr. Katz bid in the property.

Ten of the little friends of little Miriam Martin gathered at the home of Silas Obenchain Saturday to assist in the celebration of her fifth birthday. Mrs. Obenchain was the good angel of cheer, and under her skillful direction the little folks had an afternoon of enjoyment that will ever linger in their memory as one of the pleasant events of their childhood days. A dainty luncheon was served and the afternoon passed by the indulgence in children's games, and when the happy ones returned to their homes they wore that radiant smile that bespeaks complete contentment and satisfaction.

Another big rush for timber land occurred last Saturday morning, when nearly twenty left for Lake county to take up claims. The occasion for this large number was the opening of several sections in the Chewaucan country. Thursday word was received that this land would not be thrown open, but it was supposed that the message was a fake. Mail advices, however received later stated that the government had decided not to place on the market for entry a large section of this land, deciding to sell it to the highest bidder. As a result only about one-tenth of the land will be open for Biling.

The Western Union Telegraph company will shortly begin the construction of a railroad telegraph line on the Weed road from its junction with the Southern Pacific in the Sacramento canyon at Weed to the front at Grassy Valley and the line will thence be extended as fast as the railroad is, toward Klamath Falls. The Weed railroad has heretofore had only telephone wire service.

Hon. G. T. Baldwin returned home Monday evening from his trip to Boise and Salem, where as a delegate he represented this county at the National Irrigation Congress and State Fair. At Salem he delivered an address before the Development League, and for concise, practical and useful information it was one of the best epitomes on the resources and possibilities of Klamath county that has yet been given publicly.

The engineers of the reclamation service, who have made a survey to determine the feasibility of irrigating the Shasta valley from the Klamath river, have decided that it would not be wise to recommend consideration of the work until the Klamath project begins to return revenue. The great cost of the Shasta work, estimated at \$3,785,000, and the present state of the reclamation fund have influenced the engineers in their decision.
