**WINS A FREE SCHOLARSHIP**

The Normal School gives free tuition to each eighth grade pupil, in any of Southern Oregon Counties, who reaches the highest average in the yearly examinations. The last year school Miss Lucy Sheeter of the Medford Schools received the highest average, but she could not take advantage of this offer on the part of the Normal because the family moved to Portland; so the year's tuition falls to Wm. Allen, son of O. B. Allen, who received next the highest grade in the county, this being almost 95 per cent. The Normal School is satisfied with this result, as young Allen is an eighth grade graduate from the training department of the Normal and this shows that effective work is done by the student teachers under the direction of Miss Kaiser and Mrs. Wickersham.—Ashland Tidings.

**Holy Rollers May Escape**

Seattle.—Superior Judge Frater this morning ordered Esther Mitchell and Maud Hunt Creffield, charged with murder in the first degree for the killing of George Mitchell, deported to Oregon by the sheriff. The order of the court was made upon the report of the insanity commission that both women were insane. The sheriff is directed to turn the women over to the superintendent of the Oregon insane asylum. The superintendent of the Oregon insane asylum cannot confine the women without a legal order from the Oregon courts. This will necessitate a hearing in Oregon. The women, if found sane in Oregon, will have to be liberated.

The body was in an advanced state of decomposition and appeared to have been dead for several weeks; the features of the man having been effaced by time and exposure to the elements.
