USEFUL INFORMATION

Grand Rapids, Mich., is the furniture center of the world. It picks its lumber from every forest and sends it out all over the United States and to Europe, South America, Africa and Australia, in the shape of beds, tables, chairs and office furniture. There are at this writing lumber camps in Mexico and Central America, chopping out mahogany for these factories, agents are stationed at Liverpool to buy up the best timber brought in from South America and Africa for Grand Rapids, and there is scarcely a hard wood section noted for its fine lumber, which is not contributory to this point. Grand Rapids has 532 factories employing over 20,000 hands with a daily pay roll of over \$50,000. The most of the factories are devoted to furniture and some of them are enormous.
