W. R. Davis, of the Lakeshore Stage company was in the city this week making arrangements for the transportation of passengers via Merrill until the Steamer Klamath is ready to resume operations again. Mr. Davis stated that he has about closed plans for an extensive advertising campaign in which he will be assisted by the Southern Pacific passenger department. It will include the issuance of attractive folders, posters and other literature and the inauguration of excursion rates. In order to meet the increased travel, plans are on foot to greatly increase the equipment of this line, which is bound to play an important part in the growth of Klamath county.

The Merrill Record that is preparing a big anniversary number, has decided to defer the publication till the Yuletide season. It will be in the shape of a big Christmas number. Irrigation will be one of the strong cards and at this time oftentimes, the people of Klamath county never had so much to be cheerful over. The edition will aim to voice those sentiments of good cheer that permeates every nook of the county that is so much in the spot light to-day. The entire edition will be published in one of the large printeries of the state, and every effort will be put forth, we are assumed to make it an edition-deluxe.

Contractor A. M. Taylor was awarded the contract for the erection of the structure that will house the big government rock crusher and is kept pretty busy as a consequence. The crusher is located near the Upper lake. Mr. Taylor is also pushing work on the two-story brick for the Klamath Development company and several residences.

General Manager Abbott of the Klamath Lake railroad, was in the city this week getting in touch with this end of the territory. He is making preparations to handle the business of his road this winter, and with that end in view has added a new 40-ton locomotive to his equipment.

While endeavoring to replace a belt on part of the county road crusher while it was in operation, George Snyder received a blow on the head that rendered him unconscious for several hours. The injury is not as serious as it was first thought to be, but Mr. Snyder still feels the effect of the blow.

A large force of men and teams are now working on the Alameda. This street or boulevard will be 80 feet wide, on the north side of the Government Canal through the Hot Springs Addition, and on each side of the Boulevard will be planted flowers and shade trees, and when completed will be the prettiest drive in Oregon.

The frame building opposite the court house is being renovated, and will be occupied by Mr. Dyer, C. C. Brower, who had offices there, has removed to the Murdoch block, and Deputy District Attorney Keesee has taken up new quarters in the American Bank & Trust building.
