THE NEW ORGANIZATION

The organization of the Commercial Club is a wise step and one that this paper has for sometime believed necessary. The method of its founding is unquestionable, sensible and the father of the idea, H. L. Holgate, has shown rare diplomatic instincts in its conception. It meets all objections, and with a stroke accomplishes all that has been sought—the solidifying of the organization of the Chamber of Commerce, the reduction of its expenses to a point covered by its receipts and the accession of new blood that demanded something in addition to a purely commercial routine.

One of the chief arguments in favor of the new organization is the social part of it. It will act as a magnet that will attract an element possessed of a vim and vitality essential to the development of any great country. Sociability is a great booster of purse strings, and unless we are layabouts, the Commercial Club will prove to be a powerful factor in the up-building of Klamath county. The provision that to be eligible to the Club one must join the Chamber of Commerce eliminates the idea that the new organization is founded for the purpose of superseding the old one. On the contrary it will prove itself to be a great aid to that body.

Now that this move has been made, let no effort be made to block its objects. Some may doubt its worth, but whether it meets the approval of all or not, there should be no attempt on the part of anyone to interfere with its success.

ADDITIONAL BRIEFS.

J. B. Mason, senior member of the firm of Mason & Slough, left for the east Monday morning. Mr. Mason's decision was reached suddenly, and in the few days intervening he gathered together such samples of Klamath county products as he could conveniently carry in a grip. The contemplated launching of the new boat belonging to the Klamath Falls Land & Transportation company, had to be postponed on account of unfavorable climatic conditions. This will necessarily cause a delay in the carrying out of the proposed excursion of the business men of this city to Fort Klamath. All arrangements had been made by the Chairman of Commerce of our southern neighbor to care for all guests and to render a banquet to the visitors. The occasion would be one of pleasant memories, and would mark an epoch in the affairs of the county.

The Steamer Klamath has been laboring under great difficulties on account of ice on the lower lake. Saturday she had a hole knocked in her side and Monday was forced to return to this city, the ice being four inches thick. While the Klamath is able to plow through it, its movements are so hampered as to render it advisable to suspend traffic until the weather moderates. In the meantime she will be employed with work between here and Keno.

The Methodist congregation has purchased lots at the corner of High and Ninth street, paying therefor \$1250. In view of the fact that the moving of

the present church structure to this location would be an expensive operation it has been decided to sell the building, if a reasonable offer therefore can be secured. If this is done it assures the erection of a new church on the recently acquired property.

Holiday goods are now burdening the shelves of the local merchants and great preparations are being made to supply the wants and fancies of the shoppers.
