There is a work that the people of this city and county have overlooked and one that should go by default no longer. That is the urging of the rapid completion of the California Northeastern. For the past two years the people of this section have folded their hands and just waited. If instead of doing this they had gone about it systematically by sending committees to the proper officials and showing an appreciative and unselfish interest in the construction of the road matters might be in a different condition. But it is not too late to do so now. The failure of the road to reach here has enriched the signers of the bonus something like \$100,000, and we would suggest that a small portion of this sum be used in some manner that will promote the speedy completion of this line. If the railroad people are made to see that we are alive to the necessity of the road getting here it will have a good effect. It will do no harm to try, and since we have two organizations presumably created for the purpose of boosting for this county it is up to one or both of them to show that they are in existence for work and not for buncombe.

The organization of the Colorado Society, which occurred in this city last week, suggests a medium for the advertising of this county that should be employed by residents from other states now living in this county. It is the purpose of this society to interest their friends, and their friends' friends in Klamath county, and that they will be successful in their efforts is a foregone conclusion. Other State societies should be organized, as suggested by The Republican some six weeks ago, and each member should write to his home paper telling of the organization and incidentally inviting people from the district from whence he came to follow in his footsteps and take up their residence in a section that has no peer. The Colorado society has a great work before it, and The Republican wishes them unbounded success. It is fortunate in securing for its head a man of the caliber of Mr. White, for it is an assurance that it will not be employed in the promotion of selfish schemes.

Governor Chamberlain is posing in the role of the people's champion and is using his vote power with that end in view. If he had done so when the direct primary law had been passed by the legislature we would have more confidence in his sincerity. No man who approved such a law can truly claim title to being a friend of the people, but must be classed with the demagogues and self-seeking politicians and no matter what he says or does must be taken with the proverbial grain of salt.

That the people of the county are fully appreciative of the value of the Inland Empire club is evidenced by the fact of its rapidly increasing membership. Posted on the bulletin board are sixteen names whose applications will be passed upon by the organization at its next meeting. The Inland Club is a representative organization and one that deserves the confidence and support it is receiving. That it will become a pillar of strength for the good of Klamath county is certain.

When the time comes that the merchants and individuals of this city and county want their freight shipped to Ager they can have it done and no ruling made by the railroad company can prevent it.

Bank Examiner

The new banking law adopted by the recent legislature, which however does not go into effect for eighteen months yet, provides for the regulation of private banks in this state and the appointment of a state bank examiner. Speculations are already rife as to who will get the plum, which will be awarded by the state board of bank commissioners composed of the governor, secretary of state and state treasurer. The Salem Statesman says that President W. L. Vawter, of the Jackson County Bank at Medford, and representative during the recent session, has the inside track on the appointment. State Senator L. L. Mult of Jackson county is also mentioned in connection with the place.

The state bank examiner will live at Salem and have his office in the capitol building, to be furnished him by the secretary of state. He will receive \$3000 per annum, and make his inspection trips at least once a year. His calls will be unannounced, and his examinations will be conducted by methods known to himself and his assistants. For each examination of a bank the state treasurer shall collect from \$20 to \$200, according to the capitalization of such bank.

This is Worth Knowing

A few cloves added to coffee while roasting it will give it a good aroma.

Dried and hardened lemons will become quite soft again if allowed to soak in cold water for a time.

The cut side of a lemon rubbed over a dish upon which fish has been served, promptly removes disagreeable odor.

If kerosene is spilled on carpets, books or manuscripts, try removing it by sprinkling corn-meal thickly over the article immediately. Renew frequently until the oil has been completely absorbed.

Rubber overshoes can be patched with a strip of surgeon's adhesive plaster if the hole is not too large. If leather 'lifts' are fitted into the heels of rubbers the overshoes will wear longer than without them.

For cleaning windows put about a tablespoonful of kerosene oil into a quart of cold water. Rub this mixture well over the surface of the glass and into all corners. Let it stay on the glass for a few moments and then polish it off with a soft dry linen cloth. Nothing will clean windows better, though some other things may do as well. The glass will be bright and cloudless with very little trouble. Use only cold water to preserve the efficacy of the kerosene.

These are sectional maps of the entire territory included within the boundaries of Klamath County, Oregon, showing wagon roads and railroads, cities, towns, settlements, valleys, mountain ranges with elevation of principal peaks, rivers, creeks, lakes, marshes, main ditches of the irrigation project, the Klamath Indian reservation, the permanent forest reserve, Crater Lake Park and many other features of the topography.
