## Chetko Looking Good

Albert E. Imbler returned to Ashland last night from a two weeks' visit to the scene of operations of the Chetko Copper Company of this city, located in the Chetko river region, due west of Ashland, and about twelve miles from the coast. He reports things as looking exceptionally good over there, with development work under way by a force of men, who are opening up copper deposits of vast extent. "Ore veins 50 to 100 feet in width sound pretty big, and scarcely believable," said Mr. Imbler, "but we have them that are rich in copper any carry gold as well, and there is apparently no limit to the riches which our property holds. We have just added fifteen more claims to it and they all prospect well." The Chetko Company is within 18 miles of deep water transportation at Harbor and a road there will give it an immense advantage over other copper properties in the way of cheap transportation of its products.—Ashland Tidings.

Keno is situated in the Southern part of Klamath County, on the Klamath river, at the terminus of navigation. Adjoining Keno on the west is a large belt of timber, and on the east is a large body of marsh lands. Near Keno, on the river, is immense water power. Telephone connections with all parts of the country. Has a good school, two stores and two saw mills.

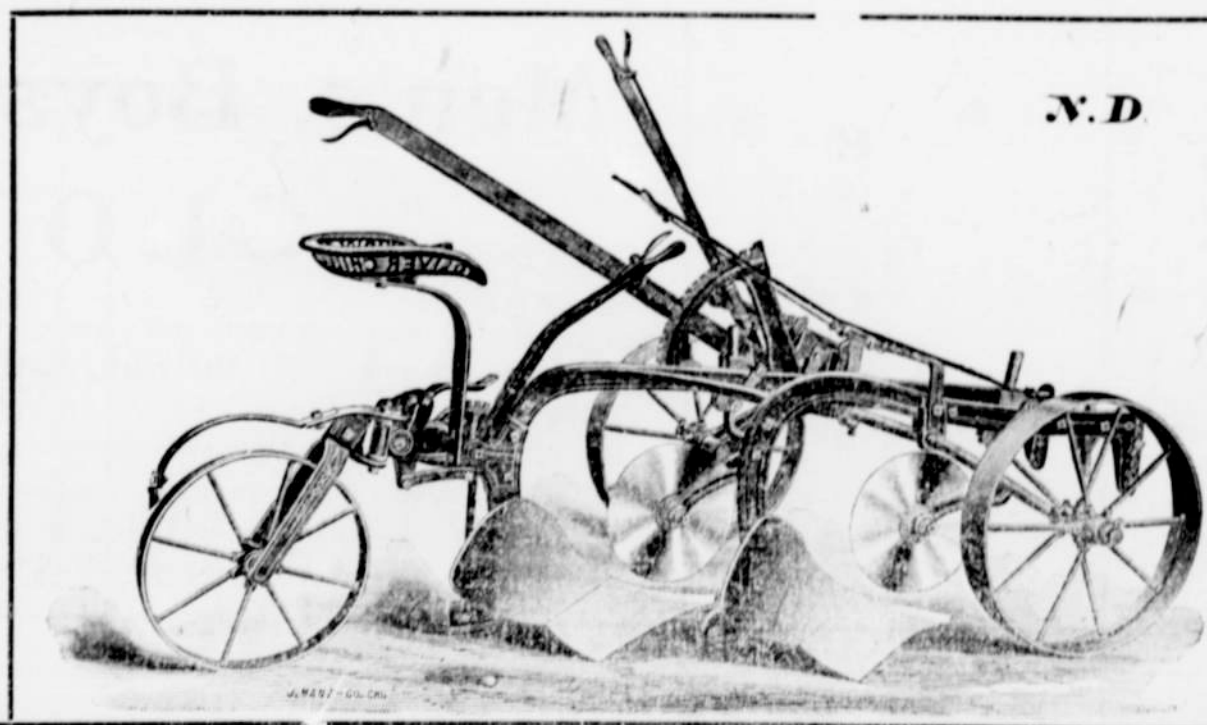
