## Screens Ordered

Orders have been placed for special screens to be used at the headgates for the purpose of keeping the fish from the Upper lake out of the main canal. Experiments have been made with a number of screens none of which have been found to answer the purpose. It is going to be a difficult matter to find a screen that will answer the requirements. As a rule fish will not enter a canal in any great number, but the Upper lake is so full of fish that they really crowd one another. Since the opening of the headgates large numbers have found their way through them and reports are coming in from the ranches of numbers of small trout and suckers that are to be seen on the land. When the new screens have been installed this will be avoided.

## Budd Springs

The efforts of the Chamber of Commerce to secure the use of Budd Springs and the adjacent land for the creation of a summer resort or a place of recreation for the people of this city has met with partial success. S. C. Bartum, supervisor of the forest reserve of the Cascade mountains, was in the city this week on official business and was visited by the Chamber of Commerce committee, consisting of Messrs. Obenchain, Fountain and White, and was asked as to the possibility of securing the springs for the purpose mentioned. He informed them that the springs had been set aside for administrative purposes, but that there was nothing in this reservation that would prevent the people of this city using that point for pleasure purposes, so long as the privilege is not abused.

## Great is Dorris

J. P. Hazen was in the city Tuesday and if anyone doubts the great future of the new town of Dorris let him interview Mr. Hazen. This gentleman is backing his judgement by investing heavily in the new town and on Tuesday placed an order for 50,000 feet of lumber with Moore Brothers. It is to be used in the erection of a fifty room hotel and a feed and livery barn with a capacity of one hundred head of horses. Associated with him in the enterprise are Sparks & Sons. This firm is making extensive improvements on the property recently acquired in the new town, and they believe that after the railroad reaches Dorris there will be plenty of business to tax the accommodations now being planned.

It is a well assured fact that the railroad will reach Dorris not later than next November. That will bring the terminus of the California-Northeastern within twenty miles of this city, and inasmuch as there are no great difficulties to surmount between this city and that town it is a safe prediction to state that the cars will be running in this city next summer, if not before. The contention has been made that it will be impossible to throw up the grade through the marsh in that time, but it is understood that arrangements have been made to put a sufficient number of graders at work to finish this part of the grade in not to exceed six months.

It has also been decided to build across the grade at the hole in the ground, the tunnel to be put in later. With the carrying out of these plans there is nothing in the way to prevent the completion of the road to this city next summer.

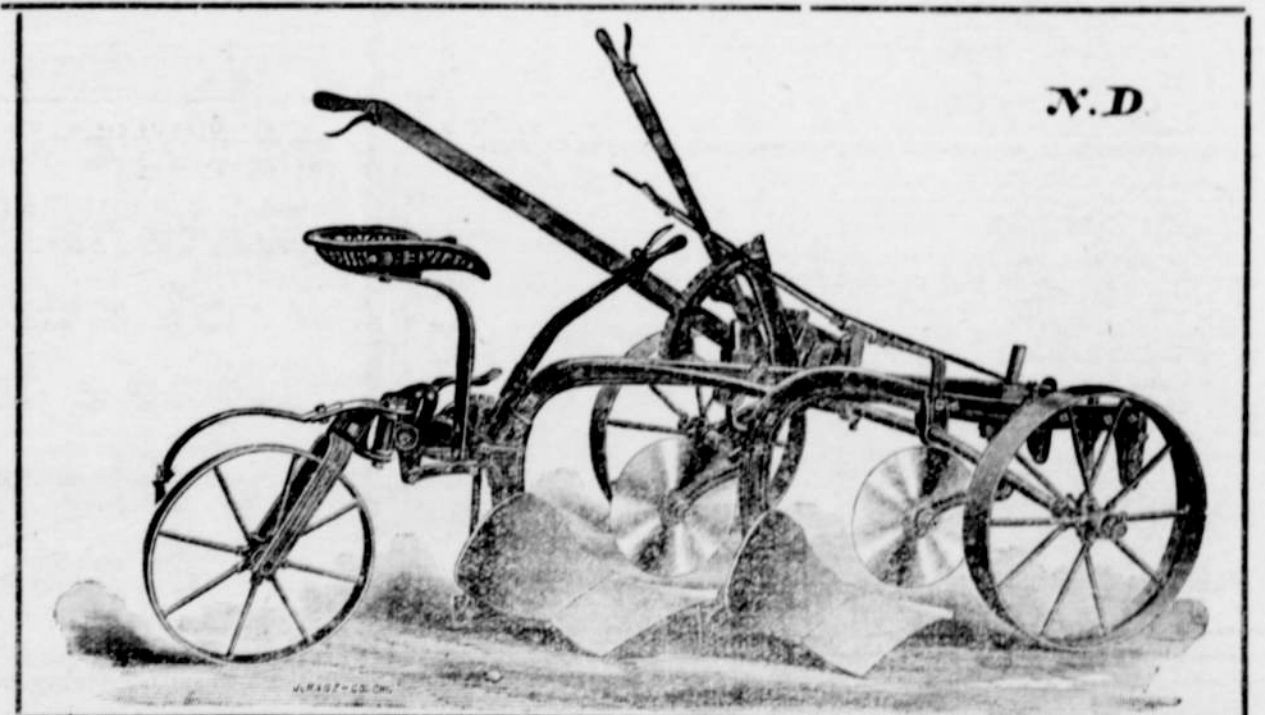
