After a hearty lunch the party accompanied by Mr. Whitney started on foot for the rim. In about half an hour four more people who had never before been there were standing on the rim gazing wild eyed at what they all declared to be the most beautiful natural scene they had ever beheld. The day was fairly clear but clouds hid the head of Shasta although Klamath Falls was plainly visible, with the high mountains south and west of the Lower lake. Aspen lake was shining like a gem to the right of lawn colored Bear Island and while the crowning beauty of the landscape was hid by a cloud, the remainder was enough to excite our admiration. As we had a drive of 22 miles ahead of us we reluctantly left at 4 p. m. leaving Mr. Whitney at Supt. Arant's house. Mr. Stilts handled the ribbons and of all of the whips in Oregon Mr. Stilts is of the best. He took us that 22 mile in a little less than three hours. While under his skillful guidance we were perfectly safe, on some of the short curves that accomplished auto driver, Jack Glazier was caught in the act of holding his breath as well as the seat.


