### California's Loss

Following is a letter that has been  
sent out to all of the papers on the Coast  
by the California Promotion Commit-  
tee. It is good advertising for Califor-  
nia and better for Merrill and Klamath  
County. Few here realize the amount  
of good done by the exhibit at Sacra-  
mento, but there are thousands who  
know that Klamath County "skinned"  
the other states and walked off with  
fifteen hundred dollars in prizes:

California has lost a fine, thorough-  
bred, registered Holstein bull, but what  
is California's loss is Oregon's gain, for  
the bull is now at the home of J. F.  
Adams, a Merrill, Oregon, farmer, who  
won him at the National Irrigation  
Congress by making the best exhibits of  
the products of a single irrigated farm.  
This prize went to Adams from the  
California Committee which offered the  
bull, California Promotion Boy, to the  
man who showed best what an irrigated  
farm could do. California farmers were  
not allowed to compete for prizes be-  
cause California was the host on this  
occasion and it would not have looked  
well to keep all the fine prizes at home.  
There were quite a number of competi-  
tors for this prize, for California Pro-  
motion Boy is of the kind of stock that  
farmers are anxious to get hold of, and  
while there were good exhibits, Adams  
made such a fine display that the  
judges had no difficulty at all in making  
the award. The bull was turned over  
to Adams by the authorities of the  
Congress and has been sent to Merrill  
where he will head the herd on Adams'  
farm.


