TWO DOLLARS PER YEAR IN ADVANCE

The Republican wishes to call the attention of the business men of this city and county to two important events that occurred during the past two weeks. The first is the County Fair; the second the sale being carried on by one of the mercantile firms in this city. The fair is admittedly the most successful ever held in this county. This success is due more to one agency than all others combined. That agency is the press of the county. It was through the medium of the county papers that the fair was advertised. It was the only publicity given it, and it is not overstepping the bounds of propriety for the Republican to claim for the papers of this county the greater part of the credit for the success that crowned the fair. As to the second event, much comment is unnecessary. Everyone saw what occurred Saturday. It proved the value of advertising beyond peradventure. Any man who would doubt the value of printers ink (when used judiciously through the columns of the papers) after Saturday's demonstration is beyond conviction. You may climb upon the house tops and shout out your wares, you may plaster the barns and fences with posters, you may devise all manner of means for reaching the people, but if you want the real, home-reaching, money producing method of advertising you must come to the newspapers. With two such prominent, convincing proofs of the value of advertising before the eyes of the local advertiser, it may not be amiss for us to ask him to stop and think, use a drop of printers ink and make all of Klamath County think, also. The two events above referred to prove that advertising will produce business and bring results, no matter how hard the times are.

The present state of affairs in the financial world might lead one to believe that times are worse than they really are. The flurry in New York city, where several banks were forced to close their doors, was due more to the wild-cat financing than to depression of business in general. Those failing were links in a chain of banks controlled by men whose chief work was gambling with stocks. They used their connection with the institutions to borrow money, and when the stocks they bought went down, there was only one thing for the banks to do—go down with them. The best evidence of the solidity of the banks of the country is the fact that none have closed their doors outside of New York city, with the exception of a few directly connected with the chain. One great satisfaction that the people of this county may draw from present events is the freedom from all the ills to which the financial institutions of the cities are heir. Out here, away from the railroad, with investments that are of the safest, where there is no possibility of loss, banks never fail, for the demands for loans are light and when made are always backed up with the strongest kind of security. There may be many things that Klamath county has not, but one thing it has and that is peace of mind, which is more than all the rest combined.

On the 2nd of next month there will be held in the city of Merrill, an election to vote upon the proposition of enlarging the city limits. The new limits will comprise land on all sides of the present boundaries and will in a far better way satisfy the needs of this rapidly growing city. At the present the town has outgrown its limits on every side.

At the school meeting held Saturday, the people of this district put themselves on record as being absolutely and unqualifiedly in favor of having the Merrill school second to none in point of equipment and excellence. Without a dissenting voice a 4 mill tax was levied for school purposes. This, in a district that has never before levied a school tax, is a credit to Merrill voters.

In E. E. Fitch and Jos. Stukel the people have two of the most conscientious and interested men of the community for school directors. Both have families and both are successful business men. That the interests of the school will be properly cared for with these men in charge, cannot be doubted. Altogether the election was a decided step toward civic progress.

After 24 days of diligent searching, the body of Morris Wingfield was found floating in one of the deep sloughs in Warner valley last Friday evening about 6 o'clock and was recovered two hours later, when a boat and help had been brought to the scene. Fred Bussy, who had never given up the search, on that evening passed the place where more than 50 men had searched and dragged the slough for days, and saw the body lying face down in the middle of the big slough with only the shoulders and head in sight. Mr. Bussy at once went for Wm. Nickolls, who had been constantly in the search since Morris Wingfield was missed on September 25th. Nickolls and Bussy returned to the scene with a boat and secured the body from its watery grave, and started for Lakeview at 12 o'clock, arriving here the next morning.

To Plat Tract

It will be divided into farms of from 40 to 160 acres each, the average price of which will be \$40 for the land actually subject to cultivation.
