The Clear Lake dam site was on Thursday leased to W. C. Dalton for \$1750. Mr. Dalton being the only bidder in the field. It will be remembered that the results of a recent bid of which Ed Brown, the sheepman of this section was the highest bidder was a re-advertisement by the government for the reason that the bid, \$1511, was insufficient. Considerable excitement was rife at the time, due to the rivalry between the sheepmen and the cattlemen, the latter complaining that sheep would ruin the range, which they claimed by right of long occupation. At the second opening of bids the cattlemen were there prepared to win, but for some reason the sheep contingent did not enter the field and no difficulty was experienced. —Record.
