Will Try Soon

J. Frank Adams, who was in the city this week, stated that it was the intention to place a force of men at work within a few days on the Tule Lake opening and see if the hole into which the water is now flowing is a mere cavern or an outlet of sufficient capacity to actually drain the lake. He believes that by using a derrick to remove the large rocks now holding back the water it will be possible to increase the flow and at the same time hold it in control, so that if the opening proves to be a cavern the waters can be shut off and not flood the surrounding country.

It is Mr. Adams' opinion that originally the waters passed under a natural bridge which at some time in the past caved in, thus permitting the accumulation of debris and the final stopping of the opening. Project Engineer Murphy expects to visit the spot within a few days and make a thorough examination of the matter. Mr. Adams is hopeful that his theory will prove correct and thus make it possible to not only drain Tule Lake but also the Lower Klamath.
