Money in Raising Hogs

From experiments made during the past year, one of the greatest money makers for the small rancher, which has developed, is raising hogs. Klamath county at the present time does not raise enough hogs to supply the home market. Large quantities of ham and bacon have to be shipped in each year. The reason for this state of affairs has as yet remained unexplained. It is an admitted fact that Klamath county pork has a sweeter flavor than even the famous corn fed pork of the East. J. D. Carroll, of the Henley and Cantrill ranches, explains the reasons of the superiority of the home grown product.

Mr. Carroll is very well informed on the subject and since his location here has been making extensive experiments with several hundred hogs on both his ranches. He is well qualified to speak. He says:

"The general climatic conditions here are peculiarly adapted to the raising of all kinds of live stock. The high elevation and cool nights tend greatly to make the animals healthy and thrifty. In Colorado, with a similar elevation to this they are now raising hogs on alfalfa and field peas on an extensive scale. It is my intention to plant peas as I believe it to be a most superior food, even better than corn. At present I am feeding barley and alfalfa with excellent results. I use a cooker for the grain and cook it with pure water and live steam."

"To my mind there is no greater money maker in Klamath county, especially to the small rancher with limited means. It takes only a small outlay of capital to put in a few hogs and with ham and bacon from 20 to 22 cents and consider that the yearly increase never is less than 500 per cent, you can easily see what a handsome profit there is in the business."

"160 acres under cultivation will keep 1600 hogs and one man is all that is needed except during harvest. In a test made with 20 hogs, feeding them for four weeks on cooked barley and alfalfa, the average gain per day was two and one half pounds. Wheat is also a good food."
