The railroad commission has made order discontinuing the investigation of the complaint against the services of Southern Pacific passenger trains Nos. 11 and 12, operating between Roseburg and Portland, with a view to ordering an extension to the train service farther south to Ashland. This action is taken because the people south of Roseburg, upon whose petition the complaint was made and for whom hearing was had at Ashland several weeks ago, failed to produce sufficient evidence in the opinion of the commission, to warrant an extension of the train service farther south than Roseburg. This order practically disposes of the case altogether.

The Railroad

Prof. C. A. Howard, who last week accompanied the High School Debating team on their trip to Medford and Grants Pass, is greatly enthused over the railroad prospects. He went out by way of Bray and came back over the same route, and noted such progress as having been made during the few days that elapsed between trips. Frank Ira White went out on the same trip with Prof. Howard, and when Bray was reached Mr. White took occasion to make an estimate of the amount of steel and ties now in the yards at that place. He found that there are enough rails there to lay 60 miles of track and almost enough ties for the same length. Mr. White is of the opinion that the grade will be completed in about two weeks and it will then be ready for the rails to a point a mile north of Macdoel. The bridges are now well under way, and only small gaps in the grade remain to be closed up. Camps are being established by Erickson & Peterson to construct the "shoofly" over the hill at Dorris. There are now about 200 men working on the grade and good progress is being made, the work across the desert being very easy. Mr. White took especial pains to learn everything possible concerning the building of the road, and he informed Prof. Howard that in his opinion there is no reason to believe that there will be any prolonged stop at any point south of Klamath Falls.
