## Must File Petitions

The law says all aspirants for primary nomination must file their petitions, fully signed, with the secretary of state before March 29 if they seek an office in the state at large or in a district composed of several counties. If they seek a county office they must file not later than April 2. The primaries will be held April 17 and state and district petitions must be filed not less than 20 days before that date and county petitions not less than 15 days.

"Before or at the time of beginning to circulate any petition for nomination to any office under this law," says the direct primary law, "the person who is to be a candidate for such a nomination shall send by registered mail or otherwise, to the secretary of state or the county clerk or city clerk, recorder or auditor, as the case may be, a copy of his petition for nomination, signed by himself."

The number of signatures required on a nominating petition "shall be at least 2 per cent of the party vote in the electoral district, provided the whole number of signers required on a nominating petition, under the provisions of this law for any office to be voted for, in the state at large or in a congressional district, shall not exceed 1000 nor in any other case shall the whole number required exceed 500 signers." Only those who may sign primary petitions who are registered as to their party membership.

Petitions for nomination for county offices must contain signers representing at least one-fifth of the precincts in the county. In petitions for nomination for district offices, for more than one county, the signers shall represent at least two counties and at least one eighth of the precincts in each county. In Klamath county candidates will have to have petitions covering at least three precincts. Democratic petitions will have to contain at least 10 signers and Republicans 12.

In Jackson county, Republican candidates before the primaries must secure 35 Republican registered voters on their petitions and Democratic candidates 28 Democratic registered voters. State officers to be nominated in April and chosen in the June election are one supreme judge, two railroad commissioners, one dairy and food commissioner.

District officers—One prosecuting attorney for Klamath and Lake counties.

One member of congress, first district.

Two joint representatives for Klamath, Lake, Crook and Grant counties.

One joint Senator for Klamath, Lake and Crook counties.

In Klamath County—Sheriff, Clerk, Assessor, Commissioner, School Superintendent, Surveyor and Coroner.

## Litigation Begins

The complications arising from the land rush last Fall are reaching a stage where the conflicting applicants are beginning to realize the endless litigation that ensues when contest proceedings are resorted to. The applicant who secured the first filing has the advantage in this that succeeding entrymen must do the contesting and he is placed on the defensive, making the cost of the contest light for him. The timber and stone applicant securing a filing ahead of a homesteader seems to be given the preference if the character of the land renders it unfit for cultivation.

The officials of the land office at Lakeview have already had hearings between a number of conflicting entrymen, but no decisions have been rendered and consequently no precedent established for the decision of the cases. The fight for the lands will be prolonged as the Department of the Interior works slowly, and it is safe to say that an appeal will be taken from almost every decision rendered by the Lakeview officials, making it necessary for the General Land Office or the Secretary of the Interior to render the final decision.

Many of the landseekers whose filings conflict have effected compromises, and by so doing avoided financial loss to themselves and also a long delay in securing title to the lands.

## Big Improvements on Reservation

Chief Clerk Swartzlander, who was recently in the city from Klamath Agency, reports extensive improvements made by Superintendent H. G. Wilson on the reservation during the past year. The Klamath Agency grounds is one of the beauty spots of Klamath county and the many modern facilities introduced by Mr. Wilson have added to its attractiveness. The grounds have been beautified, new buildings erected and old ones rebuilt, heating plants established in the schools and all public buildings and an electric light plant installed. The Agency is blessed with a system of pure running water, which is conveyed to all parts of the grounds by means of flumes. A fine system of irrigation can also be fast bringing the reservation agricultural lands under cultivation.

There are over 90,000 acres of swamp lands within the borders of the reservation. This has always been claimed by the state under the swamp land grant and the matter has been before the courts for years. Now that the decision has been adverse to the state arrangements, arrangements are being made by authorities of the Indian Bureau to drain this immense tract of overflowed land. In view of the fact that the reservation will be opened to settlement in the course of a few years, the restoration of this immense tract of hay land will be a wonderful addition to Klamath's resources.

The drainage problem, which the engineers connected with the Indian service are now studying, can be solved, it is said, without great expense by excavating a canal about a half mile in length, parallel with the river channel, which will cut the retaining ledges, and

into which the river can be turned. It will also be necessary to open up the old channel through the marsh lands at many places where it has been choked by accumulated masses of vegetation and by driftwood and pumice that the stream has carried down from the mountains. W. B. Hill, an inspector of irrigation in the Indian service, with a corps of assistants, has been making a careful survey to ascertain the proper methods to pursue in this work, as also to ascertain the probable cost, and W. P. Code, the chief engineer of irrigation for the Indian service, has also given it some personal attention. The plans for the work are well under way, and it is confidently expected that actual construction work will begin with the next fiscal year, should the plans of the engineers be approved.

## Klamath Wants Senator

For the information of our readers we will state that the 17th Senatorial District includes the counties of Crook, Klamath and Lake, and is entitled, under the apportionment of 1907, to one senator jointly.

The 21st Representative District is comprised of the counties of Grant, Crook, Klamath and Lake, and is entitled to two representatives jointly. Klamath has never, since its organization, had a senator in the legislative assembly. For many years past the honor has been conceded by Klamath to the other counties of the district. Lake has had as senator Hou. C. A. Cogswell for two terms and Dr. B. Daly for one; Crook, Newt. Williamson, and Grant, Dr. Laycock.

Klamath is now joined with Crook and Lake only on senator, and we feel that in fairness Crook and Lake will concede Klamath's claim at this time and will accord us the honor cheerfully. Conceding to Klamath the privilege of naming the joint senator and to the other counties interested the two joint representatives would seem to us an equitable distribution of the legislative candidates in which the counties are interested.
