### Rich Gold Strike

Our readers are familiar with the rich strike made by the Snowgoose boys, of Keno, who went to Rawhide, Nevada. This same section has now produced what is believed to be the richest gold discovery in the world.

At the fifty foot level of the lease of John Kearns, on Balloon mountain at Rawhide, Tom Kearns set off a shot that uncovered a breast of ore literally alive with gold and assaying clear across the six-foot opening more than \$600 per ton in gold and silver, making it by far the largest gold discovery in the history of Nevada, if not in the world.

The population of Rawhide has grown to 6000 and is being added to as rapidly as conveyance can carry fortune-seekers to the camp. The ore to all appearances is in place. The vein forms a contact between the main backbone of Balloon hill and adjoins the country rock to the west, which is altered porphyry. The gangue is in a moderately silicified kaolinized rhyolite carrying about \$3 in gold to \$1 in silver.

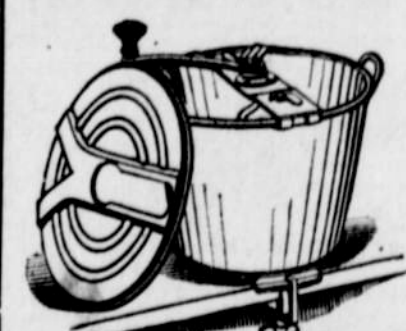
