old furniture still stands within its ancient walls.

"From this ancient city we went to Palm Beach, the most fashionable winter resort in the United States. This is indeed an enchanting spot enhanced by all the beauty which wealth can purchase. It is here that Mr. Flagler, who owns practically all the resorts, railroads and fine hotels on the east coast of Florida, has allowed his fancy to run riot and it must be next to paradise in its grandeur and beauty. The 'Royal Poinciana' hotel, built for the largest area of ground of any in the world. It can accommodate 2000 guests and seat in its main dining room 1700 at once and employs 100 servants. 'The Breakers' is second to it only in size and magnificence and is right on the ocean beach. Both belong to Mr. Flagler.

"From Palm Beach we went to Miami and found much of interest there, going by boat down the Miami river to the famed Everglades, many of which are unexplored by white men and still inhabited by bands of Seminol Indians, who go about among them in canoes.

We next went from the southernmost point of Florida to Knights Keys over Flagler's most famous road, built for many miles out into the ocean from key to key, and whose ambition it is to build it to connect with Key West. We there sailed on the 'Hallifax' to Havana, Cuba, remaining there nine days and enjoying every minute of our stay, for there we found perfect summer weather and donned our thinnest clothing. The city is one of the quaintest and cleanest we have ever visited. The principal points of interest there were going through Fort Cabanas and Morro Castle. The wreck of the Maine still lays in the harbor where it went down, decorated with wreaths of immortelles, a silent reminder of the treachery of our enemies.

A sight to stir the patriotic heart of every American who visits Cuba. I cannot stop to describe all the interesting things Cuba had to offer, space forbids. We took several trips of 35 or 40 miles into the country, thereby gaining a very good idea of its cane fields, banana, pineapple and other tropical fruit industries. On our return we visited many cities including Memphis, Tennessee, and are now in St. Louis. From here we go to Denver, then to Salt Lake and then on to San Francisco as we are all becoming somewhat weary of travel and begin to long for the sabbath of Klamath, our old friends and 'Home Sweet Home'."

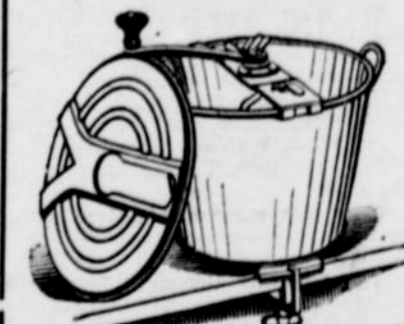
