R. C. Cowley, whose name has been presented to the voters of this county for the Republican nomination for assessor has withdrawn. He never has been a voluntary candidate, and when his name was sent to us for publication it was with the statement that his friends were desirous of forcing him into the race. Since that time a great amount of pressure has been brought to bear upon him, but he has steadily declined to seriously consider the matter. Last Saturday he took definite steps to withdraw his name and requested the Republican to discontinue his notice. In doing so he requested that his thanks be extended to his friends and to assure them that he fully appreciated their good will. His reason for not permitting the use of his name at this time was purely a business one. He realized that this section is now emerging from a dormant state into full life and vigor and that his personal interests demand that he give them the close attention they require in order to keep them abreast with the growth of the Klamath Basin. Mr. Cowley is one of Klamath's best citizens and if he had been selected for assessor he would have given this county an efficient administration of his office.

From Douglas County

Supt. E. B. Hamlin informs the News that Prof. Jas. H. Hobbs, formerly of Douglas County, but employed for several years past, as teacher at Merrill, Klamath County, is thinking of becoming a candidate for the office of school superintendent of the county on the Republican ticket.

Prof. Hobbs is well and favorably known in this county where he has held a number of important positions in our schools. He is an honest, industrious, straight-forward young man, well qualified, both by nature and education for the position to which he aspires.

While principal of the Wilbur schools he became acquainted with Miss Frankie Dimnick for whom he afterwards returned from Klamath County and carried her away as his wife.

Should the Republicans of Klamath County select Prof. Hobbs as their candidate for school superintendent, and elect him to that position, we believe they will never have cause to regret their choice.—Umpqua Valley News.

Consider the Indians

TO THE EDITOR:—In view of the fact that Klamath County is being widely advertised and every encouragement being made to secure immigration, and to make this section of Oregon the foremost, I don't believe that full justice can be done without the Klamath Reservation, which lies a few miles to the North of here, being included.

The Klamath Reservation is coming up fast compared with a good many reservations all over the United States and to make matters better will soon be a part of this state. The Indians are all self-supporting and some well-to-do stockmen. Everything is modern from head to foot and on a fair way on the road of progress.

Of course it can be truthfully said that much could have been done to make our progress more complete, if some of our people had not acquired the habit of drink, which has been the curse of the Indians as well as of the white man, and I am sorry to say that not enough has been done to put down this great wrong. In behalf of my people, the Indians, let me say right here, that a greater effort should be made to retard this evil, as it has been the cause of the government looking upon us with suspicion and has delayed the opening of the reservation. There are a good many Indians on the reservation who are sober and reliable and these are doing all in their power to raise the moral standard.

Work is now under way towards completing the allotments on the reservation and it is hoped that the work will be finished early in the Summer. This will be the first step taken by the government towards throwing the reservation open for settlement by the whites. This one event is looked forward to by a great many as the first fruits of their efforts in trying to learn the ways of the white man, and therefore many are eager for the new responsibility to be thrown upon us. A few of the Indians have not waited but have gone ahead and taken up the responsibilities and are voters of Wood River precinct, also some have been given the privilege of enjoying quietly the pleasure of looking after his own business, by doing all his own leasing, a step that I think will prove to be of great benefit. My belief is that the sooner we Indians are thrown upon our own resources the better Indians we will make, therefore good citizens, and good citizens are what Klamath County wants.

It is often asserted that an Indian is an Indian and never will be anything more than an Indian. But people who say this and think this way do not know much about Indians, and fix their ideas from the poorest material and judge the rest by them. Now, if the character of the whites was judged by the lower class of people, would it be just? Let the people judge for themselves. I mention this because sooner or later we must pull on the same rope, live under the same law, help make the laws of the country and virtually become one.

I cannot say too much of our present agent, Mr. H. G. Wilson, who has been a diligent and faithful worker among us. Under his supervision the school and the agency have grown wonderfully, the school plant being the finest equipped boarding school in the Indian service of its size. Last Fall steam and electric plants were installed and every equipment is modern. The work of paying off the Indians will soon be started. Of the appropriation of \$537,000 made by Congress in 1906, \$25,000 was paid in cash last August, and the balance prolonged for a year. \$162,000 is to be paid to us in farming implements, stock, canals and drainage and irrigation of the arid portions of our lands, and the remainder in cash with interest. At any rate it will be given to us in the way to do us the most good. This I am sure will be a great advantage to the country, as the more money there is in Klamath the better it will be for every one concerned, as it will unite the forces of progress for the struggle.

The company propose to engage in and operate steam and electric boats on the Upper Klamath Lake and all the tributaries, including Wood river. They will carry passengers and freight.

The Lakeside company has 2500 acres of land under the Adams ditch that it will give RENT FREE for one year. This includes the use of the land and water. The renter must clear and place the land in cultivation. The renter gets all the crop but we reserve the right to pasture the stubble.

Notice to Stockholders

The Stockholders of the Klamath Water Users Association are hereby notified that the following amendments to the By-laws of said association will be submitted for their acceptance or rejection at the next annual meeting of the stockholders to be held in Klamath Falls, Ore., on the 4th day of April, 1908, at the hour of 2 o'clock P. M.:

That Section 1, Article II, of said By-Laws, be amended to read as follows:

The annual meeting of the stockholders of the association shall be held in Klamath Falls, Ore., at a place to be designated by the Directors, and stated in the notice hereafter provided for, on the first Friday immediately preceding the first Saturday in June of each year, at the hour of 2 o'clock P. M. (The first annual meeting under this By-law shall be held in the year 1909).

That Section 2, Article V, of said By-laws, be amended to read as follows:

At all elections any owner of stock of this association, whose assessments have been fully paid, is a qualified elector and shall be entitled to one vote for each and every share of the stock owned by him, not, however, to exceed in the aggregate 100 votes.

That Section 2, Article III, of said By-laws, be amended to read as follows:

Each Director shall at the time of his election be a qualified elector and the owner of lands situated in the irrigation district to which shares of stock of this association are appurtenant, and shall also be a resident of the district.

That Section 4, Article III, of said By-laws be amended to read as follows:

The annual election of Directors, commencing with the year 1909, shall be held on the first Friday immediately preceding the first Saturday in June of each year, at the time of the regular annual meeting of the association and such Directors shall hold their respective offices for one year, or until their successors are elected and qualified.

Notice of special meeting shall be given by publication in the same manner as for regular meetings; such notice shall be given not less than twenty days before the date of such meeting.

Will Revise Tariff

Before the present session of Congress adjourns there is to be action definitely fixing a tariff revision programme and starting the wheels preparatory to the enactment of a bill next year. The action probably will take the form of a resolution in the House, either authorizing the ways and means committee to sit during the Summer or instructing that committee to employ experts to gather data for use when Congress next convenes.

The standpatners who control the ways and means committee at present have not insinuated the scheme and do not take to it with any feeling of satisfaction. There are indications, however, that they cannot help it, and that they either may fall gracefully in line or interpose obstacles and suffer defeat for their pains. In the event of a clash the select committee of ruling spirits in the House is likely to suffer disruption of its harmonious organization because some of its members are for the action which is scheduled.

Frederick W. Mulkey has returned from Washington, District of Columbia, where he has been for several weeks. After his retirement from the race for the Republican nomination for United States Senator Mr. Mulkey made a trip to Washington. While there it was reported that he was considering re-entering the senatorial contest.

Rear Admiral Pillsbury, chief of the bureau of navigation has announced that it is highly probable that Rear Admiral Evan's fleet will reach San Francisco bay on May 5. It was hoped that the ships would arrive sooner, but a delay will be due to the accepting of invitations to stop at San Diego and other ports en route to San Francisco.

Republicans of the First South Carolina district elected S. M. Walker and A. P. Prioleau delegates to the Chicago convention, and instructed them to vote for the nomination of Speaker Cannon.

Pelican Bay Line

A petition is to be circulated asking the county court of Jackson County for a re-survey of the Ashland-Pelican Bay wagon road from its junction three miles east of Ashland with the Oregon-California road to the county line beyond Lost Prairie. The petition will be strongly backed and will undoubtedly be joined in by residents and freeholders along the route as well as the citizens of Ashland and the county generally besides being greatly encouraged by the projectors of the proposed automobile stage line to be put on from Ashland to Pelican this summer. The latter have submitted a proposition to the county court to contribute \$2000 toward the improvement of the road and ask the support of the court.

One of the worst grades on the whole route is five miles east of Ashland and this can be avoided by changing the route for a short distance which can be done it is thought without unreasonable expense in securing new right of way. Another change in route for a short distance near the summit is asked.

The route has been surveyed to the Neil ranch and from there to the county line is a distance between 9 and 10 miles, through which there is only a road of easement now, though traveled for many years.

The Ashland-Pelican route is known as the Dead Indian route and is capable of being made into one of the best of vehicle roads as it is the most scenic of routes to Klamath lake resorts.—Ashland Tidings.

Elks Temple at Ashland

The Ashland Lodge of Elks has purchased a 74x151 foot lot on Main street in Ashland, on which they will construct a \$25,000 Temple. The price paid for the lot was \$1750. C. H. Burgraff will probably furnish the plans for the new building.

It is proposed to build a three story brick structure to cover the entire lot, the first floor to be utilized for mercantile purposes, the second floor to have a row of office rooms across the front with the remainder devoted to social and reading rooms for the lodge members, while the third floor will be used for the lodge meetings and work room.

The Ashland Lodge has many members in Klamath Falls who are quite elated over the prospects of a new home.
