High School Wins Trophy

Standing in the middle of the hall, with his right hand uplifted, and with the words "So help me God, I have tried to do the square thing," Dr. W. A. Leonard resigned as referee of the basketball game Friday night just five minutes before the close of the second half.

The first half gave promise of a most exciting game, and ended with the White Stars well in the lead with a score of 16 to 11. Both teams had been worked up to the highest pitch of excitement as this was the game that decided the championship and they were both determined to win. After the second half began the players threw aside precaution and went in for blood and there was some rough playing on both sides. Many unintentional fouls were made on account of the slippery condition of the floor and the earnestness of the players. After eight successive fouls had been called against the White Stars, the members of that team quit with the statement "Leonard can have the cup, he won it." After considerable discussion and after the resignation of Mr. Leonard as referee, the game was continued and resulted in a score of 19 to 29 in favor of the High School. The trophy was delivered to the High School team by Mr. Mong and that team was declared the winner of the championship. The score in the second half was ample evidence that it is impossible to play basketball when you are mad. During the half the White Stars only made two points while the High School rolled up 19.

The game ended with considerable hard feeling on both sides and it is to be regretted that the High School instructors were unable to control this feeling which has been growing for some time. The White Star team, while not playing under the auspices of the High School is composed mainly of members of the school, and this bitterness is liable to work to the detriment of the educational work, and be a serious blow to athletics in the future.

By popular vote the High School was awarded the net proceeds of the series of basketball games for the Mong cup. Until the last game the fire department was decidedly in the lead, but the supporters of the school had been reserving their votes and on the last night 246 tickets were placed to the school's credit. The final vote was High School 445, Fire Department 321, and the Public Library 34.

So intense was the interest at the basketball game that the large majority of the spectators failed to hear the fire alarm, and the few who did hear it were cool headed enough to say nothing, but quietly left the opera house, which was taxed to its utmost capacity with enthusiasts who were shouting themselves hoarse whenever their favorite team would score or make a spectacular play.

The Log Cabin saloon is less than one hundred feet from the opera house, and had the alarm been heard and the location become known, it would have been a very different matter to have arrested a panic.

The game was so hotly contested that the crowd forgot everything but the players, and so far as they were concerned the town might burn, just so the play went on.

Open Bids On First

The bids of the South Branch of the canal will be opened at the Portland office on the first of April. It is said that several bids have been filed by large contractors and it is very probable that the reclamation service will see fit to award a contract to the most reasonable bidder. Should all of the bids be considered too high then the work will be done by force account. The construction of the South Branch will add a large acreage to the irrigated lands of the basin as it passes through the center of a tract, all of which is susceptible to irrigation. The surveys for laterals to take water from this canal have all been made, and many miles of laterals were constructed last year, which will enable the government to deliver water to a number of ranchers just as soon as the main canal is extended.
