There is a stronger demand for Klamath farms this year than at any time heretofore. This demand, is in a measure, due to the fact that the country has become known to many homeseekers throughout the country. The class of people coming in here are a class that are not looking for lands for speculation, but men who are looking for homes, and the land shark, or speculator has been driven out of business since the financial flurry and as a consequence the lands now changing hands are passing into the ownership of parties who expect to reside upon them. Nearly every day a number of the real estate men are seen driving into the country and everyone of them are accompanied by one or more prospective settlers. This influx of settlers has been going on for several weeks and a considerable area of land has been sold to the newcomers.
