37-10 Decision Is Reversed

That the land included in the famous "37-10" territory is doomed to startling reverses and surprises to respective litigants, is again evidenced by the decision of the Secretary of the Interior in the case of Mason C. Meservy vs. William F. Byrne, just received by C. P. Stone, attorney for Meservy. The readers of this paper will remember the decision of the Honorable Commissioner of the General Land Office, under date of January 28, 1908, in which the decision of the Register of the local land office was reversed and the decision of the then receiver, affirmed, and the contest decided in favor of the homesteader, Mr. Byrne. An appeal was taken to the Secretary of the Interior and that official has reversed the decision of the Commissioner, ordered the homesteader entry canceled and allows Mr. Meservy the privilege of filing on the land.

The contest involves homestead entry No. 3431, for lot 1, Sec. 2, in township 37 South of Range 10, E. W. M., and is one of the most valuable claims included in the "37-10" territory. The Commissioner found from the evidence that the claim contained between three and four million feet of merchantable timber, and that while the contest had not done all that the law required in the way of cultivation and improvement, that he had done the best he could under the circumstances and that he was entitled to the homestead. The Secretary holds that the residence and cultivation were not sufficient to comply with the law and that the contestee's home on the land was merely nominal.

Mr. Byrne has also been fighting the Daniels scrip with the hope that the decision of the Commissioner would be affirmed.

First Shipment of Beef Cattle

Klamath's first shipment of beef cattle for this season started from the Horton ranch last Tuesday. Chas. Whorton returned a few days ago from a trip to the Klamath marsh section and while there he brought 185 head of dry cows from Alex. Davis, which were delivered at the ranch Monday, and were started for Montana the following day to be shipped to Oakland for immediate slaughter.

In speaking of the stock conditions in the north end of the county, Mr. Horton said, "Grass is fine in that section and stock is in prime condition. The cows that I bought are in fine shape for the market, and the marsh section will supply exceptionally good beef cattle this season. The first shipment is a little early, but the stock is in such fine shape that I see no use in feeding hay."

"It is too early to say how many cattle will be taken out this year. The price of hay will have much to do with that. Stockmen cannot afford to pay the prices that are being mentioned, and there are a large number of lean steers in the county. If the price of hay is high stockmen will not fatten as many cattle as they did last year. The price at present is about six cents for prime steers and five cents for cows and heifers."

Ex-Mayor Martin Surprised

Mr. Bishop at once telephoned for a carryall and soon the party was transferred to the Upper lake landing, and next were gliding over the silvery waters in the beautiful boat belonging to the host. After being out for a few hours the party returned to the home of Mr. Bishop and partook of an elegant supper.

She was startled by a powder explosion and found the little fellow with his face severely burned.

A physician was summoned by telephone and relieved the child of as much pain as possible and the little one was brought to the city where he is now under the care of Drs. Hamilton and Fisher. It is yet too early for the physicians to render an opinion, as to the extent of the injuries sustained, but it is probable that the sight may be permanently injured.

All of the doctors being absent from the city at the time the call came, Dr. E. D. Hitchcock, of the Star Drug store, who is a student of the Cooper Medical School in San Francisco, responded and dressed the injuries.

It is not known how the accident occurred, but it is supposed that the child dropped a match into a partly filled powder can.

Melhase Buys Emma Block

An important real estate transaction was completed Friday when Major C. E. Worden sold to Al Melhase the Main street property known as the Emma block. The lot is thirty feet in width, has a two-story brick on it, and the price paid was \$12,000. The location of the property is among the best in the city and the Melhase brothers now own the entire north half of the block with the exception of the Willits property and the interest owned by C. H. Withrow in the Withrow-Melhase building.

It is the intention of the Melhases to build a fine two-story brick where the building now occupied by the KKK store and by H. J. Winters stands. It is probable that the building may be started this year, but no definite plans have been made.

Death of Mrs. E. W. Gillette.

In the hospital at Salem at 5 o'clock Thursday morning Mrs. E. W. Gillette of this city was relieved of her suffering by the angel of death.
