WORSE THAN STAGE. Parties coming in from the railroad are loud in their condemnation of the accommodations on the California Northwestern road from Weed to Colar. They claim that it is even worse than the old stage stage. Commercial men, who have been making this city for years past say that they never dreaded the trip half so much, even during the worst seasons of the stage travel. They naturally expect better accommodations on a railroad but state that if anything they are now getting worse.

Parties reaching Weed from the north have to lay over from 12 until 3 o'clock the next day. One party who arrived here the other evening describes his trip as follows: "We left Weed about 2 o'clock. The coach was crowded and a number of the passengers were ladies. They were bringing up a bunch of Greeks or foreigners of some kind. They were a dirty foul smelling lot and would have been offensive even in the open air. The small smoking compartment would not hold them and they partly filled the only passenger coach on the train. One party of four had a quart of whiskey along which they proceeded to live up on. Through oversight or otherwise no notice was taken of them by the conductor, although they attracted the attention of all the passengers. The rest of the bunch literally made a dining table of the seats which they covered with stale bread and crumbs and littered the aisles with the paper and other refuse.

"The smell in that car was something fierce, even for a man, and I am unable to understand how the women stood it. The only relief we had was when the train stopped about every five minutes and we were able to get outside and get a few breaths of fresh air. We stopped at every station and every place where there was no station from a quarter to a half of an hour, while the engine switched freight cars. The short stage ride after we left the car was bad but I did not hear one person make a kick. It was a relief to get on the boat, but we were all in when we reached here at 2 o'clock in the morning. I believe a man is justified in making a kick, when we might just as well arrived here at 6 or 7 o'clock. It certainly seems to me that there is enough travel to warrant a passenger train on this line, and I believe if the business men of this city would see that the Southern Pacific officials were aware of the conditions that you would get one. I come here because I have to. I like the country and do a good business here, but at present I cannot recommend it as a pleasure trip."

SECURE ATTRACTIONS FOR STREET CARNIVAL. G. Heitkemper, Jr., returned Saturday night from a trip to San Francisco, where he went in the interest of the Carnival. While in the city Mr. Heitkemper arranged with several attractions which will be present and take part in the big show.
