## MAZAMA SWAMPED.

Upper Lake Launch Victim of Severe Wind Storm.

Reports have reached this city to the effect that the Steamer Mazama was wrecked on the Upper Lake during a heavy wind on Sunday. The steamer was going to Wood River with a barge for a load of sand and as it was rounding Eagle Point it was struck by a heavy wind and capsized.

There were six or seven men on board, including J. B. C. Taylor, M. F. Parker and Jas. H. Wheeler. They got on the barge and with poles succeeded in reaching shore. There was a lot of freight on the steamer for Fort Klamath, but practically everything was transferred to the barge and saved.

It is stated that the water is only six feet deep at this point and that it will not be a difficult job to get the steamer afloat. The Hornet left with a crew of men Monday afternoon to attempt to raise the boat.

## SEASON CLOSING OCTOBER 20.

The Crater Lake tourist season will close on October 20. Will G. Steel has already taken off the launches on the lake and stored them on Wizard Island. To afford protection a house has been built on the island out of the heavy timbers and the two gasoline launches have been put inside where it is believed they will be safe during the winter. The Arant camp has been accommodating visitors since Mr. Steel left, but after the 20th of this month the camp will not be open for accommodations, and that means practically the end of all travel for this year.

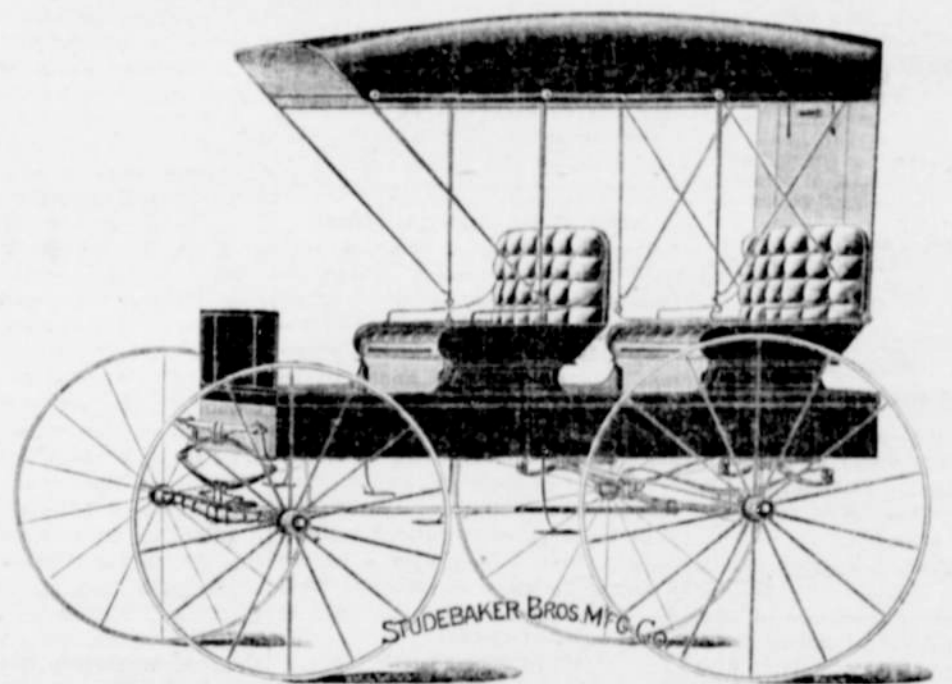
