WILL ORGANIZE FARMERS INSTITUTE AT DORRIS.

Professor W. T. Clarke, Superintendent of university extension in agricultural topics, 1908-09, will address the people of Dorris October 25th and 26th, preparatory to the organization of a Farmers' Institute. The subjects to be handled by Professor Clarke will be Agricultural Education, The Experiment Station and its Activities, The Farmers Institute Movement, Good Roads, Planting and Care of Eucalyptus, Alfalfa, Establishing and Maintaining a Deciduous Fruit Orchard, The Walnut Grove, Irrigation and Conservation of Soil Moisture, Fertilization and the Use of Cover Crops, Spraying to Control Insect Pests and Fungus Diseases, Peach Blight, Present Day Insect Problems, and Insects of the Flower and Vegetable Garden.

Professor Clarke is accompanied by Professor Hopper, also of the State University, who will handle the subject of horticulture in all its phases, and by Dr. Mack, a veterinarian of wide reputation. A movement was put on foot some time ago looking to the establishment of an agricultural experiment station at Dorris, and the Farmers' Institute which these gentlemen will organize here will doubtless answer every purpose. A tract of land comprising about fifty acres, lying just north of the city has been selected for the purposes of the station, and next season will see practical lessons in every line of agricultural and horticultural work.

MAZAMA STILL UNDER WATER. J. B. C. Taylor, one of the owners of the Mazama which capsized on the upper Lake, was here Wednesday. Mr. Taylor says that no attempt has been made yet to raise the steamer on account of the continued high winds. The boat is lying in only five feet of water and it will not be difficult to raise it. A crew will go up this afternoon or tomorrow to commence work. The cause of the capsizing of the steamer was due to the big surge which was in tow. The water off Eagle Point is very shallow and the wind made it very choppy. As the boat was tossed about, the barge which was tied to the side was forced underneath and raised one side of the boat sufficient to cause it to take water. As the waves receded it left one side caught on the barge and the boat filled and went down.

WILL SOON SELECT ROUTE.

PORTLAND, Oct. 16.—General Manager J. P. O'Brien, of the Harriman lines in the Northwest, expects to have in his possession within the next two weeks full details of the various surveys that are now being pushed into Central and Eastern Oregon for the proposed Harriman extension into that vast untapped territory. With these surveys and engineer's estimates based upon them at hand, it will be only a little time before the definite route for the new road can be announced. That will probably be shortly after November 1, and with the announcement as to the most feasible route it is expected that a certain amount of preliminary work can be done before bad weather comes.

It is not believed that the Harriman people will encounter much difficulty in securing property for rights of way, for no matter whether the line is projected in a northerly and southerly direction or an easterly and westerly, assurance has been had that the interests controlling large sections of land as well as the small holders are for the most part so eager to secure transportation facilities and railroad communication with the outside world that rights of way can be had almost for the asking. It may be assumed that right-of-way agents have already met with marked success in securing options for the various routes considered.

The matter of the selection of the route for the new line will be left to General Manager O'Brien, who was authorized by Mr. Harriman to go ahead and have surveys and estimates made, two months ago when Harriman promised the people of Oregon that the road would be built at once. Immediately after Mr. Harriman's announcement that the Central and Eastern Oregon country would be invaded, General Manager O'Brien dispatched engineers to do reconnaissance work and they were followed by several parties of surveyors to run the lines. The four or five crews sent out are still in the field and they have gone over two north-and-south and two east-and-west routes in careful detail, and the results of their work, Mr. O'Brien said this morning would be in his hands in about two weeks.

"We have been pushing this preliminary work ahead as rapidly as possible," said Mr. O'Brien, "and have gone over the several routes which have already been mentioned in the papers. There is nothing of a definite nature that can be announced until the surveys and estimates are completed and until then I couldn't even venture a guess as to whether the new line will run east and west or north and south. This will develop as soon as we have had time to go over the estimates submitted."

In arriving at a decision as to the most practicable route for the line, not only must engineering problems such as grades, curves, etc., be considered, but the right-of-way inducements as well as the productive possibilities of the sections of the state through which the road will be built. This latter feature, however, has been gone over pretty carefully by Harriman officials already, and it has been announced that no matter whether the line goes south from the Columbia River or east from some connection on the Southern Pacific main line, there are long stretches of arid and non-productive territory which the new road must inevitably pass through to reach the rich productive regions in both Central and Eastern Oregon now unprovided with railroad facilities.

SURVEY IS COMPLETED SOUTH FROM ALTURAS.

CHICO, October 16.—W. J. Costar has returned from Prattville, Plumas county, with the announcement that the Southern Pacific's surveying crew of twenty members has completed the preliminary survey from Alturas, Modoc county, to Prattville, Plumas county, and is now ready to start down Deer Creek Canyon to the Valley.

This crew, according to reports, has been in the field since the organization of a Harriman company last spring, and has made preliminary surveys for a distance of 100 miles. These extend from Alturas, thence to Feather Lake and Robbers Creek, to Prattville.

While the running of preliminary surveys is no indication that a railroad is to be constructed, hope is high in Chico that a line will be laid in the future and Chico will be the first point out of the mountains. Deer Creek offers splendid sites for power plants, which it is reported the Southern Pacific is seeking. Deer Creek was surveyed by the Western Pacific, but the Feather River route was adopted.
