DENNY HAZEL CAPTURED AND IS NOW IN JAIL.

YREKA, Nov. 5.—Denny Hazel is behind the bars again. The convicted murderer who escaped from the county jail a week ago surrendered Monday morning at Klamath, near where he killed Joseph Silva on June 25th last. Hazel was brought to the county jail at 12:30 Monday afternoon. A large crowd gathered to see the escaped prisoner once more in the hands of the law.

Hazel appeared at the home of L. J. Crenshaw in Klamath at 4 o'clock Monday morning and asked to be allowed to rest. Crenshaw is a wheelwright.

Crenshaw permitted Hazel to come into his house and rest. Food was given him, for the fugitive was plainly hungry and worn.

At daylight Crenshaw dispatched one of his boys to Hornbrook, less than two miles away, to notify the officers in Yreka. The boy returned to Klamath and by agreement told Hazel that the Portuguese in Hornbrook knew that he was in Klamath and they were preparing to mob him for killing their fellow countryman, Joseph Silva.

The elder Crenshaw advised Hazel that his safety lay in going to Yreka and giving himself up to the sheriff. Hazel, scared thoroughly, agreed to the plan.

By preconcerted arrangement on the part of Mr. Crenshaw a buggy drove by at this time. The buggy was hailed and Mr. Crenshaw and Hazel drove rapidly away to Yreka, Hazel cheerfully throwing himself upon the protection of the wheelwright.

Details of Hazel's flight are not known at this hour, farther than that he made direct for Hill, the lumber town near Coles station. He had worked at Hill and was familiar with the lay of the camp. He got into a cabin that had been occupied by Italian laborers and equipped himself with coat, vest and hat.

Hazel shaved himself with a bit of a corset steel he picked up on his travels. He sharpened the steel on a rock. It made a poor razor, judging by the number of gashes made on his face.

Hazel wears a woebegone expression. He is emaciated from hunger and weary from long travel afoot and exposure.

NEW CORPORATION.

Articles of incorporation were filed with the County Clerk this week by J. F. Goeller, J. T. Shortt and H. L. Benson for the forming of the Ready Made House Company. The company owns the agency for the Ready Made House for the state of Oregon.

This new industry has met with success from the start. The company is capitalized at \$15,000 and the first offering of \$12,000 worth of stock was subscribed in a very short time and many of the leading business men of Klamath Falls are numbered among the stockholders. It is recognized that the establishment of the industry will mean a great deal for Klamath Falls as the territory is not limited to this county but includes the whole state.

Mr. Shortt, the organizer of the company, stated today that he had already received orders for 50 of these houses to be ready at different periods from December to next July. It is his prediction that the company will build 1000 houses during the next year.

Mr. Goeller has practically all the machinery ready and two expert workmen are on the way and will be here within a few days. It was not the intention of the company to begin operations this fall, but on account of the unprecedented interest taken in the project and the large demand for building which are being received every day, it was decided that it would be necessary to begin operations this fall in order to fill the orders of those who are anxious to have the buildings ready for early spring.

Mr. Shortt says that he was surprised at the number of applications received for stock. He was afraid at first that he would have some difficulty in securing capital to take hold of the proposition with him, but wherever he finds a party who has seen the buildings in use he has always had a voluntary application for stock. The first offering has all been taken and there is now no stock on the market although the remaining \$3,000 worth will probably be sold later.

ENORMOUS COST OF BAD ROADS TO FARMERS.

The importance of the farmer to this country is well understood by most people, and it is coming to be realized that the extravagance of the farmer, in a measure, the extravagance of the nation. In a recent address, Albertson S. Cushman, one of the experts of the department of agriculture, dwelt on a single phase of rural extravagance to which this country is largely subject: bad roads. There are in this country, he finds, 2,151,760 miles of public roads, and the latest available statistics, those of 1904, show that only 7 per cent of these roads are improved. During the year 1905-06 there were hauled over these roads \$5,487,000, 999 pounds of farm products. From this great total, it is plainly apparent that any slight reduction in the cost of hauling would amount to a great sum, if applied to the entire country. Mr. Cushman figures that the average cost of hauling per ton per mile is 25 cents. On stone roads in good condition, the cost is reduced to 8 cents per ton per mile, and on stone roads in only fair condition, the cost is 12 cents. On earth roads containing ruts and mud, the cost is 39 cents, on sandy roads, 33 cents when wet, and 64 cents when dry. Although one cannot actually see this money going, the figures indicate that the United States is paying about a million dollars a day as a penalty for bad roads.

REPUBLICANS TO CONTROL THE HOUSE.

CHICAGO, Nov. 5.—It is now certain that the Republicans will have control of the next House of Representatives. The return from 355 Congressional Districts give Republicans 196, Democrats 159, missing 196. Necessary majority for control, 196.

There will be many familiar faces in the next Congress, including Speaker Cannon and his chief lieutenants—Payne, Dairiel, Tawney, Burton of Ohio, McCall of Massachusetts and Barthold of Missouri. There was especially vigorous opposition to Cannon, Tawney and Dairiel, but they are all reported as victorious.

On the Democratic side, Champ Clark and De Armond of Missouri, Clayton of Alabama, Rainey of Illinois, Ollie James of Kentucky, Ransdell of Louisiana, and Francis Burton Harrison and Fitzgerald of New York are returned. Delaware will send a new Republican, Heald, in place of Representative Burton; Georgia a new Democrat, Hughes, in place of Lewis, and Illinois, James M. Graham, Democrat, in place of Caldwell, Democrat. Frank Dodge, Republican comes from Michigan in place of Barragh, while Clarence G. Miller, Republican, will occupy the seat of Adam Bede.

Mr. James Wight, former County Superintendent, whose home is in this valley, passed on his way to the Falls on a business trip Thursday.

Mr. John Pool and family moved to Olene last Tuesday where he will work in the shop with his father; and the ranch on which he has been living, which belongs to Mr. John Donnell, will be taken back by the owner and farmed by him next year.

Messrs. Godfrey and Fred Beck of Yonna Valley, who raised about two thousand bushels of oats this year, are supplying a number of ranchers from Bly with this grain.

Mr. and Mrs. Emil Egert of Yonna, have made a business trip to the Falls this week.

This week two wagon trains hauled by twenty-one head of mules, passed through Yonna on their way to Lakeview. The teams belonged to Mr. McIntire and were hauling freight, dried fruit and clothing, for the merchants at Lakeview.

Mr. Vieira, who runs the road ranch on the old Hildebrand place, is having his entire house shingled. The work is being done by Mr. Bliss.

Mr. Will Smith, of Bly, is offering 125 head of cattle including 30 steers, at \$16 a head for sale. As hay is scarce he will dispose of his cattle and go into the sheep business.
