James Seaton is breaking up new land on his homestead.

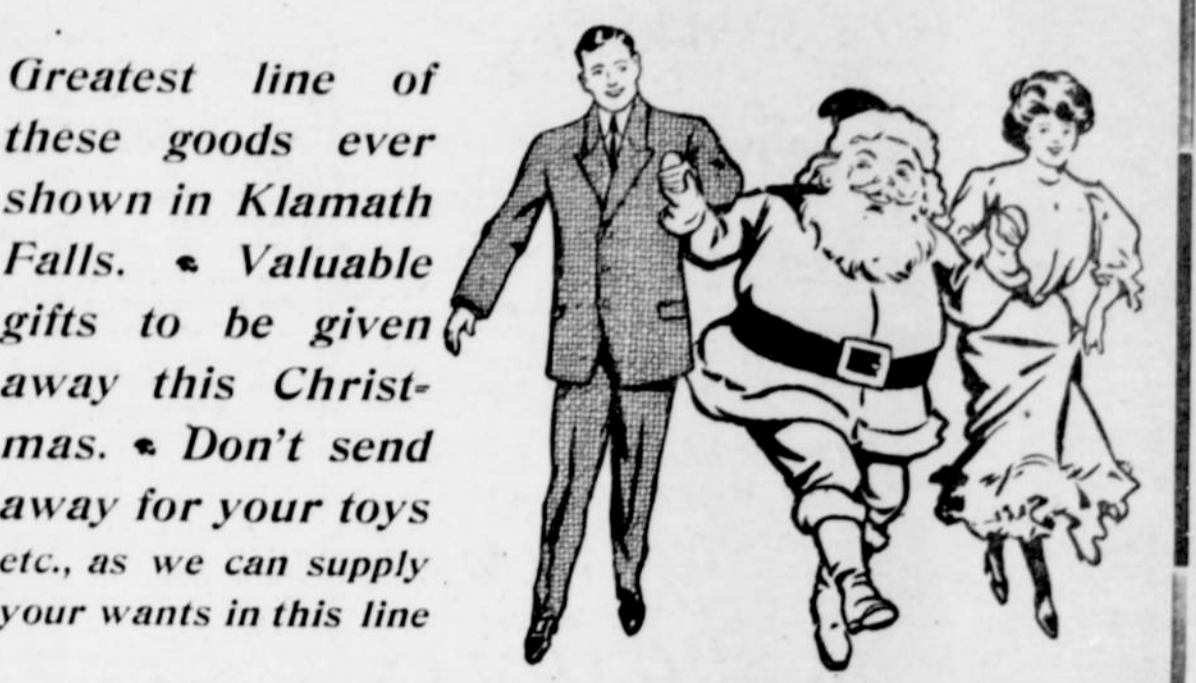
Considerable interest is manifested in the Sabbath School at Lorella and the attendance is good.
