Peltz, which was recently destroyed by fire. It was at first reported that Mr. Peltz did not have any insurance on the machine, but he had a policy with the Springfield Company for \$1800.

Don J. Zumwalt returned last Friday from the Lower Lake, where he has been surveying the new town site of Worden. He will return after Thanksgiving to complete the work. Mr. Zumwalt states that preparations are being made for the removal of the terminus from Calor to Worden, which is to take place the 25th. Mr. McIntire is getting quarters ready for his freight teams.

John Ackley is up from Keno where he has been putting in logs for the Ackley Bros. mill. He states that he had to stop hauling on account of the wet weather which makes the roads too muddy to travel. He has been hauling the logs to the river as fast as they were cut and he now has enough in the water to supply the mill for some time. The wounded man was taken to Merrill and as the foot was so badly torn it is believed that he will lose it.

LATER—As we go to press, word comes that Mr. Ivory died at 4 o'clock Friday morning. Death was due to blood poisoning. Following the first operation, the leg was amputated at the knee, then at the hip. The patient was not strong enough to stand the last operation.

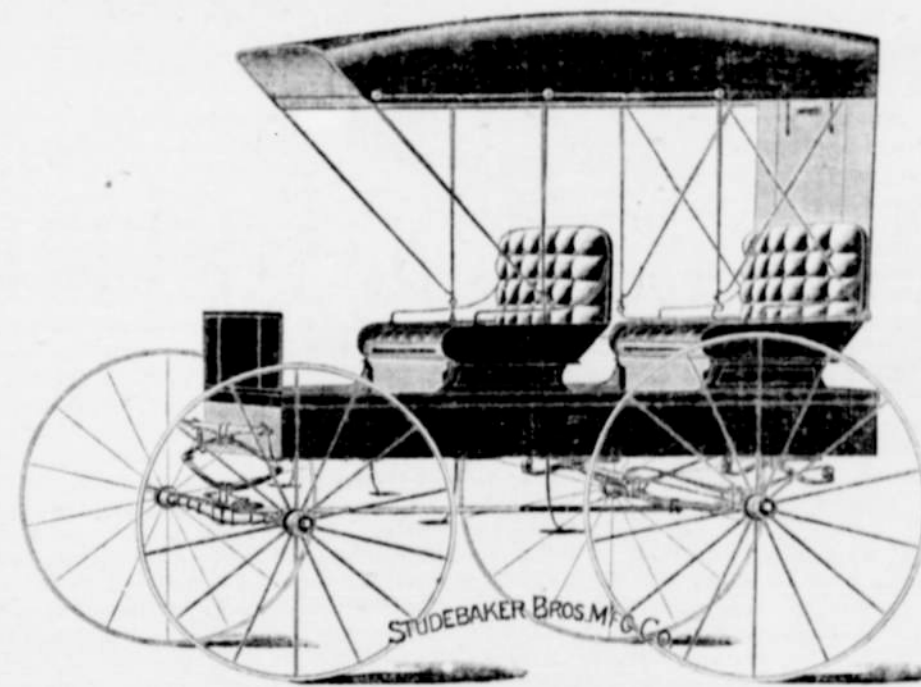
