Good Roads in Other States.

The state of Massachusetts was one of the first to consider seriously the question of building its roads under the authority and care of trained men. The legislature, feeling this need pressing upon the people, outlined a plan by which a commission of three suitable men was appointed to take charge of and build certain lines of road throughout the state, based upon the needs of the communities and the physical conditions. This commission has now been in existence for about 15 years, and it has built in that time nearly 1800 miles of thoroughly well devised stone and gravel roads. It has taken charge of the construction of several hundred miles of town highways which have been built under the direction and supervision, but which still remain town ways.
