SCOTTY TIRES OF FAST LIFE.

Walter Scott, Death Valley Miner, Makes Application to Enter United States Navy.

CHICAGO, Dec. 29.—Walter Scott, otherwise known as "Death Valley Scotty," entered the United States recruiting office today and declared his intention of enlisting in the marine service.

"Scotty" came into prominence a few years ago when he arrived in Chicago on a special train with the announced intention of getting rid of part of his fortune supposed to be located in Death Valley. His efforts to establish a reputation as the champion spender of the world occupied columns in the papers for a time. The source of his income was a matter of much speculation and it is said has never been cleared up.

"I have set the pace long enough," said "Scotty" today, "and this life does not agree with me. I am going to lead a quieter life."

If "Scotty" passes the physical examination, he will join another batch of recruits and be sent to New York tomorrow, from which port, after ten days spent in closing up his affairs, he will be sent to Cuba.

ACTUAL FREEDOM OF CUBA.

Complete Independence Will Be Established by Departure of American Troops on New Year's.

HAVANA, Dec. 29.—New Year's day will witness the beginning of the evacuation of Cuba by the army of pacification, which has been in possession of the island since the beginning of the provisional government, in October, 1906. The first provisional regiment of marines, numbering 900, which will be among the first troops to leave, are now concentrating from various posts at Camp Columbia.

About half of this regiment will sail in January on the cruiser Prairie, which arrived here Christmas eve, bound for Newport News. The Prairie will return about the middle of the month and embark the remainder. The final embarkment will not occur until April 1.

Cubans are greatly pleased by the departure of the American forces, as marking the complete establishment of independence. All show the kindest feelings toward the troops.
