MAY SELL TIMBER.

Settlers Must Simply Swear That the Land is Not For Speculation -Free to Sell. WASHINGTON.—For the second time the United States Supreme Court has interpreted the timber and stone act, and for the second time rendered a decision adverse to the contention of the government.

CHANGE IN JURY SYSTEM.

Bill To Be Introduced Reducing Jurors to Six and Allowing Five-Sixths to Find Verdict, Except in Certain Cases.

To amend the state constitution so that in all criminal cases except the most serious offenses the jury shall consist of six instead of twelve men, and that in all cases except murder in the first degree and treason, five-sixths of the jury may find a verdict, is the purpose of a measure which will be offered to the Legislature when it convenes, a week from Monday.
