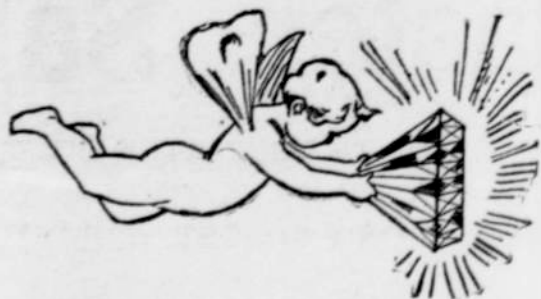

Fred Pine, of Bonanza, who was arrested at Lakeview on a statutory charge, was brought to this city on Saturday and placed in the county jail awaiting a preliminary hearing.

Sam C. Trayner, one of the pioneer residents of Klamath County, who has been living in California for a number of years, arrived from San Jose Monday on a short visit. It has been seven years since Mr. Trayner was last in Klamath Falls and he misses many of his old time friends. He sees many changes in the city in the way of improvements. Mr. Trayner owns a valuable ranch near Merrill which is now worth considerable more money than it was when he left here.

Col. M. L. Allison has received from the Pioneer Assaying & Refining Co., of San Francisco, the assay on six samples of rock taken from near the mining tunnel which has recently been opened up near Merrill. All of the samples were surface matter, and two were taken one mile north of the tunnel; two one and one-half miles northeast and on the west side of the mountain, and one about a 1000 feet east of the tunnel. They assayed from .2 to .05 ounces of gold per ton, with a valuation from \$1.03 to \$4.12. One sample was disintegrated matter and taken from the face of the tunnel, and assayed .15 ounces to the ton with a valuation of \$3.09.

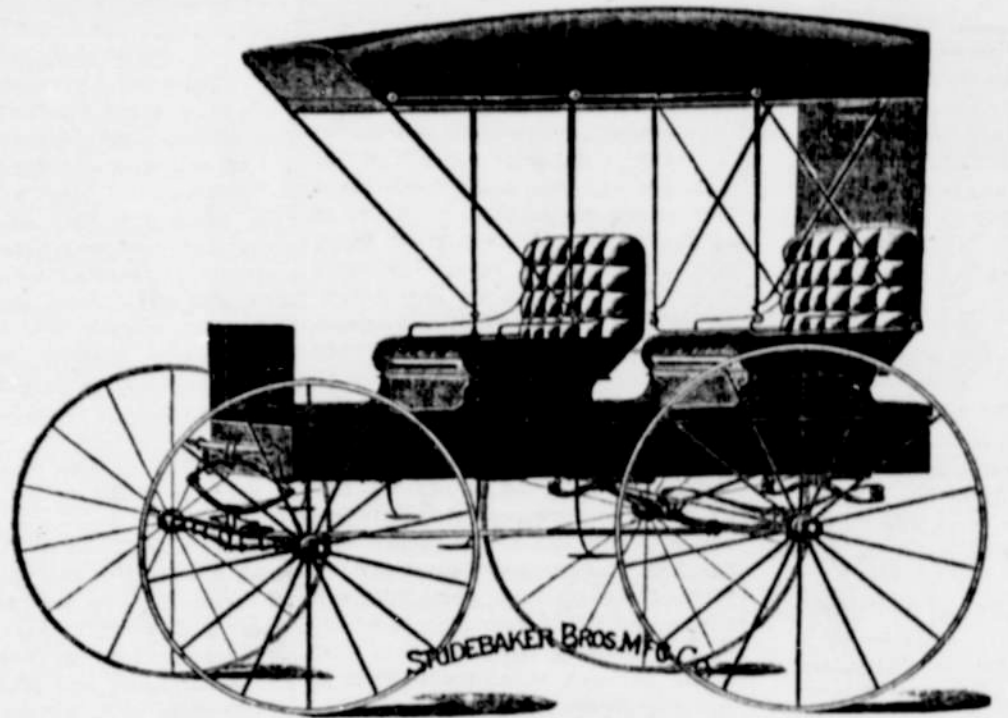
