GRAZING LAND LEASED.

J. F. Kimball, who is looking after the Weyerhaeuser interests in this section, has returned from Lakeview, where he has been leasing the grazing lands of the company. Mr. Kimball states that all of the lands belonging to the company east of the upper and lower Klamath Lakes in Klamath and Lake Counties have been leased for this year, and arrangements are now under way for the leasing of the lands in the Pokegama and Aspen Lake counties.

Dave Elder, the big sheep man of Lake County, has leased 51,590 acres in the Gearheart mountain section, and is planning to secure enough more land in the Pokegama forest to run at least 10,000 sheep. Mr. Elder will have about 40,000 sheep this year.

The Weyerhaeuser people and the Forest Service have an arrangement whereby all of the lands in the reserve, both government and that belonging to the company, is handled under the supervision of the Service. Parties leasing lands belonging to the company in the reserve waive

their right to that certain acreage, and are proportioned an equal acreage when all the lands are allotted for grazing. In this way there is no chance of conflict between the government and the private interests.

It is the policy of the government to accommodate the small owners, and each year it becomes necessary to limit the number of sheep or cattle allowed to each man. On account of the new people asking for lands, the allotments will be eventually reduced to allow a very conservative number, probably 1200 to 1500 to each man. That number is considered sufficient to allow a man to make a good living, but it does not encourage the large stockman.

The policy of the Weyerhaeuser Company, on the other hand, favors leasing to large operators, and preference is given to old customers. If it were not for the large holdings of the Weyerhaeuser and other companies, it is asserted, the big sheep men would have to go out of business, as they would be unable to lease grazing lands in large enough bodies.

The far-seeing Lincoln, realizing that one of the dangers of America would be lax enforcement of the laws, spoke a word of warning, of local application at this time: "Let reverence for the law be taught in schools, in seminaries and in colleges; let it be written in primers, spelling books and almanacs; let it be preached from the pulpit, proclaimed in legislative halls and enforced in courts of justice. And, in short, let it become the political religion of the nation; and let the old and the young, the rich and the poor, the grave and the gay, of all sexes and tongues and colors and conditions sacrifice unceasingly upon its altars."

A sufficient contest affidavit having been filed in this office by John B. Volmer, Dorris, Calif., contestant, against homestead entry No. 2957, April 22, 1903, final certificate No. 9329, issued August 11, 1908, for the W 1/2 NW 1/4, SE 1/4 NW 1/4, NE 1/4 SW 1/4, Sec. 12, T. 41 S., R. 7 E., W. M., by William A. Oley, in which it is alleged that said William A. Oley has utterly failed in respect to said entry to comply with the public land laws of the United States and the rules and regulations established thereunder with reference to establishing and maintaining residence upon said land; that he did not establish a residence in a house on said land within six months from date of entry; that he has never resided continuously, or at all, upon said tract of land; that he has never cultivated or improved the same, and that his only pretence of complying with the homestead laws was to erect a box house thereon and a small log stable, and immediately thereafter said homestead entryman left said premises and engaged in business in Klamath Falls, Oregon, and that he also leased and farmed a tract of land belonging to his father, G. W. Oley, who resides in Siskiyou County, Calif., where said tract of land so leased was located, and that for the past year, and for more than a year immediately preceding his making final proof on said homestead entry, the contestee was engaged in the business of conducting a saloon in Siskiyou County, Calif., at a place commonly known as "the hold in the ground."

That said contestee submitted his final proof on said tract of land on or about the 22nd day of April, 1908, but that no patent has issued thereon. That the only pretence of cultivating said land by the said contestee, or anyone in his behalf, was the ploughing of about half an acre, which said ploughing was done just prior to the date of submitting final proof; that he never cultivated said land, or any portion of the same, to crop, or made any pretence of ever cultivating said land other than the ploughing herein mentioned; that for more than a year prior to submitting his final proof on said entry, the said contestee had completely abandoned said land and made his home elsewhere, except for the visit made to said tract of land at the time of ploughing, as herein set forth; that his alleged absence from said land was not due to his employment in the Army, Navy or Marine Corps of the United States as a private soldier, officer, seaman or marine, during the war with Spain or during any other war in which the United States may be engaged, and that said parties are hereby notified to appear, respond and offer evidence touching said allegations at 10 o'clock a. m., on May 21, 1909, before R. M. Richardson, U. S. Commissioner, at Klamath Falls, Oregon, and that final hearing will be held at 10 o'clock a. m., on June 9, 1909, before the Register and Receiver at the United States Land Office at Lakeview, Oregon.
