MISS McCLURE WINS MEDAL

The largest crowd that has gathered at the High School during Commencement week assembled Thursday night to hear the McClure declamatory contest. The contestants all acquitted themselves with honor, and their performance would have done credit to much more experienced speakers.

After a piano duet by Myrtle Carter and Olive Masten, Garrett Van Ripper opened the contest with an oratorical selection, "Toussaint L'Ouverture." This declamation is taken from one of Wendell Phillips' abolition speeches, and contains some magnificent flighty oratory, all of which were well handled by Mr. Van Ripper.

Next came Nina Wilson with Charles Hjckens' "Child's Dream of a Star." Miss Wilson has a remarkable voice, and the manner in which she delivered her selection made it appear to the following speakers that a supreme effort would be required to outdo her.

Vincent Yaden rendered "King Robert of Sicily" in an attractive manner. His gestures were probably the best of any speaker on the program. "The Doom of Claudius and Cynthia," given by Orva Orem, is a very dramatic selection, and was given in a most pleasing style.

In "Regulus to the Carthaginians" Henry Price showed remarkable talent and excellent spirit. Such ability properly directed for a few years would make of Mr. Price a platform speaker of a high type.

The last declamation, "Brier Rose," by Marjorie McClure, was the winner. It was Miss McClure's excellent imitation of the Brier Rose herself that won the hearts of the audience and the decision of the judges. From the beginning she

seemed perfectly at ease on the platform.

The judges were Mrs. Zumwalt, W. H. Harris and W. H. Mason. Mr. Mason presented the medal. Henry Price was second and Nina Wilson third.

Much credit is due Professor Howard, who spent many long hours in drilling the students in perfecting their parts.

YREKA (Siskiyou Co.), June 5.—The law firm of Beard & Beard of Yreka has commenced an action in the Superior Court of Siskiyou county for and on behalf of the heirs of Charles B. Boyes, deceased, against the Churchill Company; the Siskiyou County Bank; the widow and children of Jerome Churchill, deceased, and W. L. Hobbs. The action is to quiet the title to and set aside the sale of the Boyes' ranch and other property in Butte valley, this county. The land included in plaintiff's complaint embraces over 3,000 acres of the richest portion of this fertile valley. By reason of the great value of the property involved, this is one of the most important actions instituted in this county in many years.
