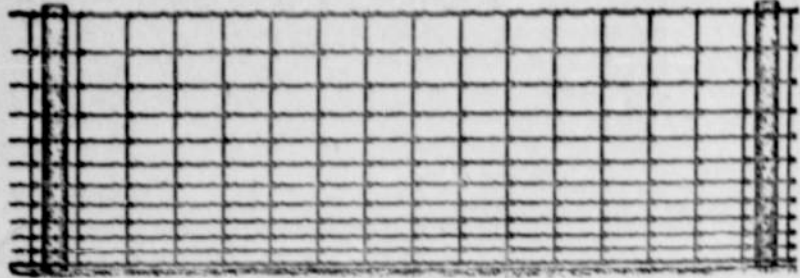

Fred Dinger made final proof on his homestead in Swan Lake valley before R. M. Richardson, United States Commissioner, Saturday.

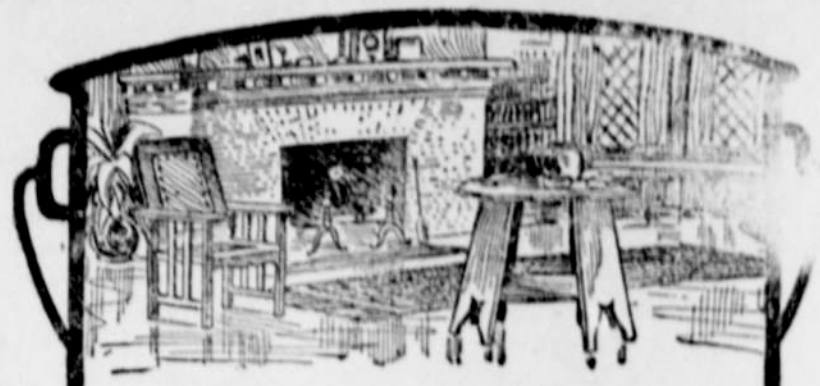
From 120 to 150 passengers are on the Shaasta limited going north daily, and all berths are engaged to the middle of August.—Medford Tribune.
