SACRAMENTO MERCHANTS ARE COMING TO KLAMATH.

Are Awake to the Possibilities of the
Queen City of the Cascades.

The Jobbers' association of Sacramento decided at a meeting last week at the Sutter Club to make an excursion to Klamath Falls on a special train the latter part of July or the first part of August. July 26th was mentioned, but not settled on definitely.

It was planned to make a five-day trip, so that the business men who take it may drop off and see their friends in most of the towns along the way, besides making a stay of a couple of days at Klamath Falls. It will not be exclusively a trip of the wholesalers. Other business men will be permitted to go, too. By this extension it is anticipated that a much larger number will take the excursion. Families may go also. It is expected that a total of 125 people at least will make the excursion. The cost of it all is estimated at \$4,000.

The object, of course, is to make friends with the business men of Klamath Falls and vicinity. The opportunity here for local jobbers, and the necessity for prompt action to get a foothold before Portland firms have won over the trade their way, has been brought home to local business men by reports in the same tone from their traveling men who have some acquaintance with the Klamath region and see how fast it is going ahead.—Sacramento Bee.

PREPARE FOR CELEBRATION OF NEXT FOURTH OF JULY.

Dr. Dupuy Suggests That Steps Be
Taken for Next Year's Big
Event.

Dr. A. A. Dupuy has suggested that while the Chamber of Commerce is considering the matter of holding a county fair here this fall that it also take up for consideration the question of a celebration for the next Fourth of July. While this time may seem a little premature for the consideration of such a celebration, the argument advanced by the doctor is a good one. He is of the opinion that if the announcement is made now that Klamath Falls is going to have a mammoth celebration one year hence it will serve notice on all other towns and cities in this vicinity that we have pre-empted the right to have the only one in this section. He also believes that it will be possible to interest the Southern Pacific company in more ways than one, and he is willing to lend his aid in securing its active cooperation.

Among the attractions he suggests for the occasion is the securing of the State militia. This, he thinks, can be done if the matter is properly presented to the governor. Included in his program of events is the water carnival, which he believes can be made as notable on the coast as is the festival at Portland, or any of the other annual events held in the cities along the Pacific.

The question is one that should have the careful consideration of the Chamber. The time is at hand when this city should select some date, whether the Fourth of July or some

other time, when a celebration typical of the country shall be held here annually. It would be hardly advisable to select the Fourth as a permanent date, but the first event could easily be held on that date and next year should be selected as the time of beginning.

HOLABIRD PLACES NEW BOAT ON UPPER LAKE.

The Only One of Its Kind in the
State, If Not on the Coast.

If the boats and launches on the Upper Lake could talk there would be gossip galore among them this summer, and there might, perhaps, be an appeal to the government for the enforcement of the exclusion law or a demand for the enforcement of the penalties connected with the violation of the alien labor laws. The cause of all this trouble would be a new boat that Colonel Holabird has brought here for use on the waters of the Upper Lake. It is nothing less than a Chinese sampan. It is no imitation of the real thing, either, for it shows the ear marks of having passed from the hands of the native workman, and has undoubtedly seen service on the rivers of China.

The boat is about sixteen feet long, with the usual swan-shaped bow. The mode of propulsion is the old-fashioned sweep that swings from the stern of the craft. Several characters in Chinese are to be seen on its sides. The boat arrived here last evening, and was to-day taken to the boathouse of Telford & Son for calking and such other repairs as may be necessary to make it "seaworthy."

MEDFORD APPEALS TO GOVERNOR FOR RELIEF.

Judge Hanna Is on Vacation and
Will Not Hold Special Session.

City Attorney Porter J. Neff and Mayor W. H. Canon are in Salem with a petition to Governor Benson asking that he send a Circuit Court judge to this district to hold a special term of court in order that the condemnation proceedings brought by the city of Medford against M. F. Hanley for a right-of-way across the Hanley place on Little Butte creek for the gravity water system might be heard and the amount of damages assessed. This step was decided upon after Circuit Court Judge H. K. Hanna refused to hold a special session of court during the time that he was taking his summer vacation. The petition which Attorney Neff will present to the governor is in the form of resolutions passed by the City Council and signed by County Judge J. R. Neil, as required by law. Should the governor fail to grant the petition and exercise the power vested in him by law to send such a judge to this district, it means that the city of Medford will be delayed indefinitely in getting a supply of pure water into the city, which will shut Medford out of revenue from a water system which taxed the city to its utmost to install, and for the lack of such pure water endangers the health of its residents, throwing the city open to an epidemic of typhoid fever.

SPECIAL MEETING OF DIRECTORS IS CALLED.

Committee's Work Will Be Gone Over
and Discussed and Plans Out-
lined.

The secretary of the Water Users' association has sent out a call for a special meeting of the directors of the organization, to be held in this city on July 23d. The purpose of his meeting is to consider the report of the committee appointed to confer with the officials of the United States Reclamation Service, which report was prepared before the adjournment of the committee yesterday. It is not likely that the labors of the committee are ended, the report to be considered being only one of the steps that are to be taken in reaching a definite understanding with the government.

None of the members of the committee would indicate what its report would contain, nor what progress has been made. It seems to be the desire of all of them to reach a definite and permanent agreement with the service and settle for all time the differences that have existed.

N. S. Merrill has had his home connected up with the Moore electric line and will have his house and barn lighted with electricity. In addition he will install a pumping plant, using a motor for power. All work around the place will be done by the electric motor insofar as it is possible to do so.

J. R. Robinson and O. Stansbury went up on the Curlew Tuesday, their destination being Spring Creek, where they will remain for a few days fishing.

DR. MADRIS IS STILL LANDING BIG ONES.

Adds to the Number of Whoppers
Another Fourteen Pounder.

A wireless was received from Fishdom to the effect that there is a great exodus of the big bass out of town. The trouble is not due to any scandal among the "higher ups" or fear of prosecution for any of the latter day doings of high society, but on account of the fear of Dr. Madris, of San Francisco, who is establishing a reputation as the champion fisherman of the season. The latest catch to drop into his basket was a fourteen pounder, which he landed at Spring Creek Tuesday morning. This office was the recipient of this big fellow, and The Herald begs to assure the Doctor it was fully appreciated.

The biggest catch of the season was the 18-pounder which the Doctor presented to his rival for honors, Mr. Pendleton. As matters now stand, he has a long string of rainbow trout weighing above twelve pounds. He expects to continue the work for a day or two longer, it being his intention to leave for home next Friday.

A. A. Davis, from the Upper Klamath marsh country, arrived in this city Tuesday. He returned home the next morning. Alex says he expects to put up about 1,000 tons of hay this season, which will require the services of fifteen men. The going wage in that part of the country during the harvest is \$2 per day and board.
