

### BIG FREIGHT SHIPMENTS

Paisley, Plush, Bly and Bonanza Among the Towns Shipping Through This City.

That Klamath Falls will be the main shipping and distributing point for Southeast Oregon is a foregone conclusion, and no better indication of this is found than the amount of freight that is being passed through here to these eastern points at this time. Manager Kenyon of the Trans-fer company reports that they loaded out Tuesday two eight-horse teams for Plush, Ore., with 26,000 pounds; two six-horse teams for Paisley with 21,000 pounds; two four-horse teams for Bly with 16,000 pounds; and one four-horse team to Bonanza; also eight carloads of wool have already gone out, and there are still about forty carloads more to go.

In view of the immense trade to the east which is only waiting to come here, the merchants of this city should at once get together, go after this trade—and get it. This can be done by getting acquainted with these people, and also by urging the County Court to put the roads in shape at once, so that a rancher can hitch up and come to town any time.

His value, however, is not sufficiently great to permit \$100-per-acre wheat land being used exclusively for grazing purposes, and the Indian pony is disappearing because the land from which his sustenance is gained is more valuable for other uses.

### BENSON CANDIDATE FOR SECRETARY OF STATE

No Ambition to Be Governor—A Sad Disappointment to Many Who Sought His Place.

With the positive announcement that he will be a candidate for Secretary of State and not for Governor, Frank Benson, at present Governor and Secretary of State, has changed the political aspect. It has been generally known among Governor Benson's friends for the past six months that he preferred continuing as Secretary of State rather than running for Governor in 1910, but not until last Thursday, when he was passing through Portland on his way to California, did the Governor commit himself definitely and give a formal announcement of his plans for the future.

Men who have been aspiring for Secretary of State have been hoping that Benson would strike out for Governor, and the aspirants for Governor have wanted Benson to run the second time for Secretary of State. Now that Benson has declared himself the candidates for these two offices will have to change their plans to fit the new conditions, and a new line-up will be under way in a few weeks. The men most disappointed at the decision of Benson are those who want to be Secretary themselves, and had been laboring under the impression that the Governor would prefer being head of the State.

In his announcement, Governor Benson says he wants to show a good record as Secretary of State and be elected to the position on the record. He became Governor through the election of Governor George E. Chamberlain to the United States Senate, and had personal ambition to be the Chief Executive of Oregon. Benson's wishes will be deferred to by many Republicans, although it will be a disappointment to others. Whether the men who have been grooming themselves for Secretary of State will step aside for Benson, or whether they will make a race for the nomination, it is too early to say for some of the aspirants have not made up their minds.
