## FACTS ON FARM LANDS

Every Commercial Body and Development Association in the West Asked for Information.

Every commercial body and development association and reputable land dealer in the west will be asked to furnish reliable information about available farm lands in its section to the assembled delegates to the National Farm Land Congress to be held in Chicago in the latter part of November.

In this way uncommonly complete information will be secured, covering the lands that are open for settlement, either through purchase or homesteading, together with accurate statements as to the possibilities in various farming lines in the various states.

The executive committee of the congress is going after facts in this way because it wants real facts. It will gather data that will be of enormous value and which could be gathered in no other way. Having gathered this information the congress will devise means for placing it before the farm-seeking public.

It is planned to have each locality where there is available farm land represented at the congress. Plans have been worked out to such an extent that the very great success of the congress is assured. The co-operation of most of the state executives has been secured. Many governors of states are upon the advisory committee of the congress. Federal officials also are participating in the movement.

It is not the plan to make an exhibit of the products of various regions. The idea is definitely to reach and inform the millions as to the farm home building opportunities of the sections in which the various commercial and promotion organizations are interested rather than to make a display of products of the few score thousand people who personally will be able to attend the congress.

The congress means to promote a desire for farm life and increase the momentum of a movement toward the farm now felt everywhere in America.

The cost of participation, to commercial bodies, will be nothing except the expenses of such delegates as may be chosen to represent the farm land interests of various sections. The sessions of the congress will extend throughout an entire week.

Land owners and dealers are also asked to participate in the work of the congress. The reputable dealers in farm land of the country are in a position to furnish definite information with reference to the lands of any locality, and the publicity arising from the proceedings of the congress will be of immense advantage to the land owner and dealer in the development and increase of the homeseeking and homebuilding spirit.
