DAIRY DEVELOPMENTS

The frosty nights lately have put a stop to the fall plowing. Albert Bergdorf shot a coyote within thirty yards of his door one morning last week.

Chas. E. Drew returned from his trip to Lakeview last Sunday. He brought a load of apples with him. Miss Smart of Ashland has been visiting with her friend, Miss Kittie Wells, the Dairy schoolteacher, for a week.

The recent wet weather delayed the potato digging, and now that the ground is frozen, it is hard to finish the job.

A young man named Van Valkenburg has been in the valley purchasing yearling cattle, paying good prices for them.

Fred Beck has been butchering some of his two-year-old steers lately—some that were not rounded up soon enough to sell on foot.

Many farmers have been taking their wheat to the Bonanza mill lately, exchanging it for flour at the rate of \$1.50 per hundred for the grain.

W. L. Wilkinson is the name of a new settler in the valley. He lately purchased a part of the D. Y. Gray place from Chas. E. Drew and is building a new house for his family's use. He has a grown son.

John Lind, having sold his place in the northern part of the valley, is selling off his surplus trappings about his farm and preparing to remove to the Willamette valley in the spring, where a brother of his is living.

Wm. Uhrmann would feel flattered if he were to hear the comments made by his neighbors regarding his work as road supervisor. He is frequently referred to as the best supervisor the district ever had, and the one most interested in seeing that the county shall not lose any money it pays for its work.

A surprise party was tendered Miss Elsie Oden Saturday evening, the occasion being her 18th birthday anniversary—and the Oden mansion in Pine flat was crowded to repetition with the many friends who came to do honor to the young lady. And, by all accounts, it was a most enjoyable occasion. Social chat and games ruled the hour until midnight, toothsome refreshments being served before the departure of the guests. Many and tasteful mementoes of the happy event were presented to the guest of honor by her friends during the festivities.

A dancing party was given last Friday evening by Mr. and Mrs. Manuel Vierra at their home, the Hildebrand place, in honor of the valley's threshing crew, which was largely attended and was a most successful affair, the young people continuing their merry-making till almost morning. An elaborate and bounteous supper, supplied by the ladies present, was served at midnight. Most of the people of the valley who dance were present, and all seemed to enjoy the occasion with a relish. The orchestral arrangements were not very elaborate, but they were effective.

It is a notable fact to residents of the upper irrigation project that the answers made by the directors of the Water Users association to the questions propounded by Senator Carter in his circular letter to the water users, contain at the recent meeting with the Senate Committee, no reference whatever to an adjustment of the benefits to the lower project bestowed by reason of the building of the Clear lake dam and the consequent reclamation of the land now covered by Tule lake. And many people are wondering why this omission was made. Are the majority of the board of directors so biased in their judgment that they are unwilling to afford any measure of justice to the people of the upper project? Do they propose to play the hog because they are in a majority on the board? If, by the building of that dam, some 40,000 acres of that land are added to the lower project, thus lessening the cost per acre of the irrigation of their lands, are they so narrow as to imagine that the upper project ought to pay for that reservoir site and for the building of the dam without any corresponding benefit, while their project reaps all the advantage? Let Mr. Stevenson (the most persistent kicker for what he calls justice) rise up and answer why the plea and petition of the shareholders of the upper project was cut out of the combined answer to Mr. Carter's questions. I had reason to question his sincerity before, and this ignoring our plea for justice doubly emphasizes my poor opinion of him and his board. It seems clear that the benefits resulting from the reclamation of the Tule lake lands ought to inure to the upper project and not to the lower, and that the plea which was made to that end ought to have gone into the answers read to the senate committee. If not, let Mr. Stevenson answer and let the public why it was excluded from the report. Let the gentleman from the sand dunes take the floor.

Spokane, Wash.—The doors of the second national apple show were thrown open when President Taft touched a golden key at the White House. A million and a half apples of all variety are on exhibition. The show covers more than ten acres of space, and entries from all over the United States are on display.

London—M. Bleriot, the Frenchman who startled the world by piloting his aeroplane across the English channel, will not appear during the American aviation week at Los Angeles, Cal., unless he receives \$50,000 for his services. Bleriot proposes competing at the Egyptian meet, which is causing no small amount of discussion throughout Europe, and unless the American promoters meet his terms he will probably try for some of the valuable prizes that will be offered in the land of the sphynx. Several French aviators who have been approached with offers to appear in the United States have expressed their willingness to take their craft across the ocean.

Kingston, Jamaica—Meager reports received here show that enormous property damage was wrought in the interior by the storm and hurricane of last week. Railroad traffic is completely paralyzed and it will be weeks before the highways are passable.

Washington—Formal announcement was made at the department of justice of the reappointment of Francis J. Heney as assistant attorney general to represent the government in the Oregon land cases.

San Francisco—In all probability Francis J. Heney will continue his duties in this city as assistant district attorney until January 1st, when his term expires. The announcement came suddenly, as it was not expected he would go back to Oregon.

Washington, D. C.—A movement has been started to have congress take action to prohibit football in the District of Columbia as a result of the death of Archie Christian, the University of Virginia football player who was hurt in the game with Georgetown university Saturday.
