

CEMENT MAY HAVE TRIAL

Sellwood Has New Paving Material for Residence Streets
(Portland Oregonian)

A proposition to lay cement pavement on side streets will be submitted to the people of Sellwood through the Board of Trade, and may revolutionize street improvements, if it is as represented. A committee from the Board of Trade is now investigating the different kinds of pavements used in the city, and has reached the conclusion that for side streets the hard-surface pavements that are being laid in the city are too expensive, and that the cement pavement may solve the problem. Ex-Councilman Willis said yesterday that the cement pavement can be laid at about \$1.25 a square yard. Mr. Willis said that there is no patent on this pavement and any contractor can put it down.

"It is very hard to introduce anything new in the way of pavement," said Mr. Willis, "but I am informed that a cement pavement is what is wanted for suburban districts. I should favor its use if it is shown that it is a good improvement, and will reduce the cost to the home-builders. If it is found good for Sellwood, it will be good for other suburbs, many of which are now looking for an inexpensive hard-surface pavement. We shall hold a meeting of the Board of Trade early next month, and then receive a definite proposition to lay the cement pavement."
