

WORKERS IN SHIRT WAIST FACTORY MEET FIERY DEATH

Awful Holocaust in Philadelphia, Due to Panic and Inefficient Protection

PHILADELPHIA, Pa., Jan. 19.—This city was the scene of one of the worst holocausts in its history today, when fire destroyed the Ellis building, used by C. Shedaker & Sons as a shirt waist factory, and four other firms employing girls. As soon as the alarm was sounded the employees of the different firms became panic-stricken. The fire gained headway so rapidly that before half of the occupants of the building had reached safety all avenue of escape had been cut off. Nearly one hundred of the trapped girls retreated to the upper floors of the building. Many of these becoming frenzied with fear jumped to the sidewalk, being instantly killed.

Every engine in the city was summoned to the scene, and many acts of heroism were performed by the firemen. After the hardest kind of work all of those who had sought refuge on the roof were rescued. Over forty of the girls are missing, and it is believed that they are in the burning structure, which is a seething furnace. Five bodies have already been recovered. Over thirty have been taken to the hospitals suffering from burns and injuries received in jumping from the windows.

The Ellis block is one of the oldest structures in the city. It is a four-story brick, constructed under old-time methods. It was a veritable tinder box and the flames spread with the greatest rapidity. A faint effort had been made to comply with the city regulations relating to fire escapes, but those in use were inadequate to meet the demands. Nothing is known of the origin of the fire.

RELIGIOUS FRENZY RESULTS IN DEATH OF BABE

Parents With Their Children Await Arrival of Millennium

BELLINGHAM, Wash., Jan. 19.—Crazed by religious frenzy, George Fashot and wife, of Linden, a small town near here, stripped themselves and their children and mounted the roof of their home to await the coming of the millennium. The weather was freezing cold. As a result of the exposure, Martha, the 11-month-old baby, is dead and the 2-year-old sister is at the point of death. The parents and the two older children were placed under arrest and jailed, charged with disorderly conduct. Their arrest was accomplished only after a fierce struggle with the officers. They refused to be clothed when jailed, declaring that the Bible was the only proper protection from the elements.

When the residents of the town learned of the cruel death of the infant they notified the officials that if the Holy Rollers were not deported from the town they would take the matter into their own hands and deal summarily with them. The feeling here is intense and the officers have taken every precaution to protect their prisoners until they can be removed to Bellingham.

Fashot and his wife acted on the instructions they received from one of the elders of the cult. This elder is a resident of Seattle, and the police of that city are searching for him. He will be placed under arrest as soon as he is located.

PHOTOGRAPHER ENRAGES CONVICTED BANKER WALSH

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Jan. 19.—Banker John R. Walsh arrived here from Chicago this morning, bound for Leavenworth, Kas., where he goes to begin serving his five years' sentence in the Federal penitentiary for violation of the National banking laws. The trip from Chicago to this city was without incident, the convicted man and his companions occupying a drawing room in one of the Pullmans.

As the party alighted from the train at the Union station in this city, Walsh espied a local newspaper photographer in the act of taking a snapshot at the group. He flew into a passion and, darting for the operator, grabbed the camera and smashed it to pieces. He stated that he had been subjected to injustice enough without being caricatured in the papers of the country. He refused to make any statement for publication, and as quickly as possible he boarded the train for Leavenworth.

PITTSBURG IS IN GRIP OF BIG ANNUAL FLOOD

Police Boats Busy in Lower Section Section Rescuing Flood Victims

PITTSBURG, Pa., Jan. 19.—The immense ice gorge that has been

gathering at Freeport broke early this morning, resulting in the flooding of all the lower section of the city. The police boats are busy today rescuing families that have been marooned by the rising waters. The waters of the Allegheny are rising rapidly, and it is expected that the highest record will be reached. Thousands of men are idle in the small manufacturing towns nearby because of the high water.

The loss of life has been confined to one man, who was drowned while trying to navigate the river on an improvised raft.

ICE GORGE ON THE UPPER OHIO RIVER BREAKS

Entire Middle West Anxiously Awaits Efforts to Save Ship From Destruction

EVANSVILLE, Ind., Jan. 19.—The entire Middle West is watching with the keenest interest the race on the Ohio River that holds for its prize the lives of twenty-five passengers on the little steamer Laurie, running between this city, and Paducah, Ky. The rising temperature has resulted in the breaking of the ice gorge that for the past ten days has been accumulating in the upper Ohio, and it is rushing with the utmost speed toward the Mississippi.

The Laurie left Paducah this morning with twenty-five passengers aboard, and when last seen was headed upstream with full steam. All efforts to signal the vessel failed and it is believed that she is doomed to be crushed by the mass of moving ice, as all places of refuge have been cut off.

It is believed that the steamer is near Mt. Vernon, Ind., and every effort is being put forth to reach it in time to warn it of the impending danger.

PINCHOT-BALLINGER RESOLUTION SIGNED BY PRESIDENT

Final Act Creating New Inquisitorial Committee

C., Jan. 19.—President Taft at 4:30 this afternoon signed the resolution creating the committee that will have in charge the investigation of the Forestry and Interior Departments, popularly known as the Pinchot-Ballinger investigation. This is the final act in the creation of a committee, the proceedings before which will be watched with the greatest interest throughout the Nation. On its outcome will hang the future political aspirations of a number of men. The Pinchotites declare that it is a struggle between the Roosevelt policies and the enemies of conservation and express confidence in the outcome.
