

NEW COMPANY FORMED WITH \$100,000 CAPITAL

California and Local Capitalists Will Operate on Extensive Scale

Articles of incorporation were filed with the County Clerk Saturday by W. I. Clarke, Geo. A. Innes and C. E. Worden for a company to be known as the Clarke-Innes Lumber and Box Company. The capital stock of the corporation is \$100,000, and the shares are placed at \$100 each. Geo. A. Innes is president; C. E. Worden, vice-president; W. I. Clarke, secretary and manager. These, with H. L. Benson and A. M. Worden, will constitute the board of directors. The principal office of the company will be at Klamath Falls.

The purposes of the corporation as set forth in the articles are:

"To purchase, erect and construct saw mills and box factories for the purpose of manufacturing lumber and boxes; the construction and maintenance of railways and canals; the purchase, rental and sale of real estate; the purchase and sale of timber, lumber and boxes, and the transaction of all other business germane thereto; also the purchase, construction and maintenance of steam boats, electric launches and tug boats to be used in connection with the other business, also the erection, maintenance and conducting of hotels and the carrying on of a general merchandise business."

Mr. Innes, president of the new corporation, is a thorough lumberman. For eight years he was secretary and manager of the E. J. Dodge Company, of San Francisco, one of the largest concerns on the Coast. The holdings of the company are valued at a million dollars and they are so rated in Bradstreets. Last March Mr. Innes sold his holdings in the company with the determination of entering into business for himself. He was so impressed with the possibilities in Klamath County that he thoroughly investigated this section which resulted in the organization of the company.

The people of this city are already well acquainted with Mr. Clarke and recognize his knowledge of the lumber business. He was connected with the California Box and Lumber Company for ten or twelve years before coming to Klamath Falls. Major Worden's standing, financially, and his shrewdness in business matters has been proven too many times to allow of any doubt of the financial success of the new corporation.

In speaking of the new company, President Innes said that work would commence at once on the erection of the mills, box factory and dry kilns, and that the plant would be in running order early in the summer. The mills will be located just this side of the Long Lake mill at Shippington, and the logs will be procured from the upper lake. It is the intention of the company to build branch railroads for the hauling of the logs, and they will operate their own steam boats and barges for towing the logs to the mill.

The capacity of the saw mill will be 65,000 feet daily and this will be doubled in case it is decided to run day and night crews, which is quite probable. As the company proposes to equip for cutting its own logs this will mean a pay roll of not less than 100 men, which will mean a big revenue to the Klamath Falls merchants.

One of the most important results of the establishment of this new concern will be the opening up of the land bordering along the Upper Lake. Mr. Innes states that the company will furnish a market for the sale of timber and logs owned by individuals on the lake shores. With a ready sale for the timber many of those owning property and living along the lake, will be assisted in clearing off their lands. With a dozen or so of these homesteaders at work it can easily be seen that things will be lively around the lake next summer.

WIND AND RAIN WILL NOT DETER LOUIS PAULHAN

Declares He Will Make Flight in San Francisco Despite Elements

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Jan. 24.—(3:30 p. m.)—Just as the spectators who had gathered at Tanforan Park to witness the aerial flight of Louis Paulhan were about to abandon the hope of seeing the fearless aviator soar through the air on one of Farman's bi-planes, he announced that he would make the flight, irrespective of the elements. The wind had been blowing a stiff gale all day and rain has been pouring down, with no indication of a cessation of the storm, and no one believed that Paulhan would have the temerity to face such conditions in his air craft. His announcement was received with enthusiastic applause, and if he carries out his intention it will add another victory to his already long string and stamp him as one of the most daring aeronauts in the world.

EXPEND TWO MILLIONS IN OREGON THIS YEAR

Southern Pacific Budget Much in Excess of Any Previous Year

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 24.—(Special.)—Completion of the Natron-Klamath line of the Southern Pacific within the coming eighteen months is promised by Judge W. D. Fenton, counsel for the Harriman road, who says that at the end of that time trains of his company will be running between Portland and San Francisco over the new route, which will have a maximum grade of 1 per cent. The work is going ahead on sixty-five miles of the new route now and the remainder will be completed as soon as possible. The building of the Natron line will not only open up a large new territory that is without railroads, but will give a low-grade freight line that will eliminate the heavy grades of the Siskiyou Mountains. The budget for new equipment for the Harriman lines in this territory for the year 1910 has been made up and is in excess of the money asked in any previous year for rolling stock. The budget calls for over \$2,000,000 for new freight and passenger cars and locomotives.

The long continued cold weather of the winter has not had a bad effect on crops, as might have been expected, but has been rather beneficial to them, according to reports from different parts of the State. Fruit prospects throughout the Northwest are now the brightest in many years, it is said, the cold weather holding back the buds so long that there is little fear of damage by late frosts. This is shown particularly in the apple and pear orchards, where the crop during the past year was the smallest in several seasons. The snowfall of the winter is said to have been generally ample to protect fall-sown grain except in some portions of the Willamette Valley. The snow, too, has added moisture to the ground in the drier sections.

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PHYSICAL EDUCATION AT AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE

Fielder Jones, the White Sox Star, Will Coach Corvallis Team

CORVALLIS, Ore., Jan. 24.—J. G. Arbuthnot, who is now superintending the physical education extension work of the Portland Y. M. C. A., has been added to the faculty list of the Oregon Agricultural College as assistant to Director Angell. Mr. Arbuthnot is a graduate of the Kansas State Agricultural College and has had several years of practical experience in teaching physical education. He is considered an authority in the arts of boxing and wrestling.

Fielder Jones, the well known White Sox star of the American League, will coach the O. A. C. baseball team during the coming season. This announcement has caused great excitement among the students. It will mean a big year for the O. A. C. The schedule for the Oregon Agricultural College debating teams has recently been announced. Two debates have been scheduled with the Washington State College, one to be held in Pullman and the other in Corvallis. The Pacific University has also accepted a challenge for a debate. The girls have shown exceptional activity and interest this year, and will debate in the Girls' State League composed of McMinnville College, Albany College and O. A. C. The large number of students who are trying for positions on the teams, and the enthusiasm which has been aroused, seems to promise a very successful year.

TOKIO, Japan, Jan. 24.—The police are in receipt of positive information that five assassins have entered Korea for the purpose of killing Prince Yamagata, Premier Katsura, Resident General Sone and General Hasegawa. A big corps of detectives are at work on the case and extraordinary police activity is manifested, both here and at the Korean capital. It is believed that each assassin has been assigned one of the Japanese officials, and that if he should be captured or fail in the attempt that others are ready to take his place.

This statement is simply a continuation of the misdirected efforts of the Korean patriots to revenge themselves for the invasion of the Japanese and the consequent loss of their national freedom. It was supposed that the failure of the last plot had discouraged further attempts in this direction, but it would seem that the plotters have simply been quietly maturing their plans for a more extensive campaign of death to the high officials of Japan.

Korean Patriots Still After the Invaders From Nippon

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MIDWAY TELEPHONE & TELEGRAPH CO. SELLS OUT

Move in Line With Plans to Confine Itself to City and Through Business

DORRIS, Cal., Jan. 2.—Final papers in the deal whereby the telephone line of the Midway Telephone & Telegraph Company of Klamath Falls, running between this city and the Meiss ranch, was disposed of to a local company, were signed today. The purchasing company will be known as the Butte Valley Telephone Company and will be purely mutual. Articles of incorporation were forwarded to Sacramento today and as soon as the organization is perfected it will take over the management of its new property.

Negotiations for the sale of the property have been in progress for some time, and it is simply in line with the plans heretofore adopted by the Midway Telephone & Telegraph Company to sell all its former lines to local companies. O. B. Gates, manager of the company, came here this morning to complete the details of the transfer.

VIVIAN EVANS OF POE VALLEY IS ACCIDENTALLY SHOT

Bullet Lodges in Abdomen Inflicting Dangerous Wound

BONANZA, Ore., Jan. 22.—While engaged in butchering hogs at his home at noon today, Vivian Evans accidentally shot himself in the abdomen, inflicting what may prove to be a fatal wound. He was using a 22 rifle with which to shoot the hogs. One of his dogs ran between him and the hog he was about to shoot, and Evans struck at it with the butt of the rifle. In some unknown manner the weapon was discharged, the bullet lodging in his abdomen. Dr. Truax of Bonanza was telephoned for and he left for the scene of the accident at once. He states that Mr. Evans is in a very precarious condition and holds out little hopes for his recovery.

The Evans home is located in Poe Valley, about twenty-two miles from this city. The injured man is well known throughout the upper country.

JAPANESE AND RUSSIAN REPLIES HANDED IN

ST. PETERSBURG, Jan. 21.—Russia today handed to Minister Rockhill its reply to the proposal of the United States Government to neutralize the Manchurian Railway. It is believed that it is adverse to Secretary Knox' suggestion.

TOKIO, Jan. 21.—Japan's reply to Secretary Knox' note, suggesting the neutralization of the Manchurian Railway, was today handed to the American Ambassador. It is known that Japan refuses to coincide in the plan, coaching its reply in such terms as will preclude a reopening of the case.

LITTLE HOPE FOR IMPRISONED MEN

FISHKILL LANDING, N. Y., Jan. 22.—The rescuers at work in an effort to rescue the six men imprisoned in the Ashokan tunnel are despondent, believing that there is little chance of reaching the imprisoned men in time to save their lives. The tunnel is a part of the great water system under construction by the City of New York. The accident was due to an explosion of nitroglycerine which occurred yesterday afternoon. Eleven are dead, five bodies having been already recovered.

FIRE THREATENS MISSISSIPPI TOWN WITH DESTRUCTION

GULF PORT, Miss., Jan. 21.—The town of Wiggins, near here, is burning, the business section having already been destroyed. The fire is now sweeping the residence district. It is reported a number of people have been killed, but it is impossible to secure its confirmation. A train load of fire fighting apparatus has been sent from here.

REAL ESTATE MAN ARGUES ON COURT HOUSE PROPOSITION

One of the most amusing arguments so far advanced in favor of retaining the court house in its present location was contained in a lecture delivered by a real estate man whose uncle has interests adjoining the court house grounds. Several of our citizens were looking at the large painting now on exhibition in the Star Drug Store window. The picture shows the court house on the site proffered by the Klamath Development Company. Comments were made on the advantages, scenic and otherwise, possessed by the proposed location. The opinion was expressed by a bystander that it was the proper place for the court house. This gave Wilber White an opportunity to demonstrate his narrowness and selfishness. He at once began to promulgate the doctrine of his bosses. We give his argument as it was given to us. We do not consider it of value, but do look upon it as a huge joke, one which may amuse some of the Herald readers. White said:

"Don't you think that it will go down there. The farmers know who their friends are. If they don't know they ought to know. Who loans them money when they need it? The banks, or the Hot Springs Company? Why, the banks, of course. "The Hot Springs Company sends all its money to Los Angeles. Didn't Naftzger go to Europe and take \$250,000 with him? Why, of course, he did? Where did that money come from? Why, from the farmers, of course. The very ones that borrow from the banks. "Yes," replied a bystander, "they will loan you money if you have the collateral." To this White replied: "Why, of course, that's business. But many a farmer has borrowed money from the banks without collateral, or in amounts in excess of any security he could give. "The bystander here replied: "I was never able to borrow a cent unless I had d— good security. "White's reply to this was not heard by our informant, but Balaam's ass also spoke.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 21.—It was announced at the Department of Justice today that another suit will soon be instituted against the Beef Trust by the Government. The department has been investigating the complaints that have been made against the trust, in which it has been charged with restraint of trade. 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BEEF TRUST THREATENED WITH ANOTHER SUIT

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ARRESTED CHARGED WITH PASSING BAD CHECKS

His Eighteen-Year-Old Victim Taken to Her Home by Her Father

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Jan. 21.—J. E. Woodward, of Mendocino City, arrived here last night for the purpose of taking home with him his daughter, Hazel, aged 18, who was arrested here in company with Robert E. Caldwell, with whom she had eloped. Caldwell had been placed under arrest, charged with passing worthless checks and wife desertion. Mrs. Caldwell is now at Mendocino City. J. E. Woodward stated that Caldwell had taken advantage of his daughter's inexperience and persuaded her to elope.

HOUSE CUTS APPROPRIATION FOR PACIFIC COAST

Columbia and Sacramento Rivers Improvement the Only Exceptions

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 21.—With the exception of the appropriation for the Columbia River and the work on the Sacramento River, California, all other Pacific Coast estimates for harbor and river improvements fell before the pruning knife of the river and harbor committee of the House. The cry from the start was economy, and it was only after a most strenuous fight on the part of the Oregon and California delegations that these two items were left intact.

The only thing that saved the Sacramento River was the fact that the appropriation made by the State of California would be lost unless Congress appropriated the entire amount necessary for the carrying on of the work. It was at first proposed to appropriate only \$50,000, to be used with a like amount of money, but the legal advisers of the committee stated that unless the entire sum was appropriated the money from California would not be available.

The committee then decided to appropriate only money enough to secure the rights of way for the strengthening of the San Joaquin channel this year, because it will take a year to secure them. Next year's appropriation will provide for the carrying on of the actual work.

SENATIONAL ESCAPE FROM DEATH BY FRENCH AVIATOR

Machine Catches Fire While at Great Height and Is Destroyed

ORAN, Algiers, Jan. 21.—Ollie Stagers made the most sensational escape in the annals of aeroplaning today, when the plans of his machine caught fire from his engine while at a great height. As soon as he discovered that his machine was on fire he attempted to alight before the machine collapsed. When within 30 feet of the ground the fire had made such progress as to destroy the steering apparatus and a portion of the glides and he lost control. Realizing that his only chance of escaping with his life lay in abandoning the machine, he jumped and sustained but slight bruises. The machine hit the ground with terrific force. If Stagers had not jumped he would have been instantly killed.

AMERICANS UNFIT TO RUB ELBOWS WITH THE GERMANS

Aristocracy of Kaiserland Up in Arms Over Court Receptions
