Project Engineer Patch stated Wednesday that he had not yet received announcement of the Secretary abandoning the upper project, but undoubtedly official verification of the report would be received in a few days. Notice has been received of the transfer of \$50,000 of the funds appropriated for the Klamath project to the Umatilla Project. This now makes a total of \$75,000 which has been withdrawn from this project, and is sufficient evidence of the intention to cut down the work here.

quiring any engineering ability has been abandoned and the government has stopped with the partial construction of a simple gravity system, which any schoolboy could have carried out. And this is to cost the people \$30 an acre. It did not need the continued statements of engineers to convince anyone that this is the most feasible and easiest constructed project in the United States, and should have been done at a very low cost. It contains the richest lands in any government project, and if they will not pay the necessary cost it must be concluded that the whole scheme of government reclamation has been a dismal failure. However, it is plain that what the farmer has lost some individual has gained.

Cattle are said to be doing finely but farmers complain that they are eating lots of hay.

George Smyth has made a bid for carrying the mail between Dairy and Yonna postoffice in this valley.

Coyotes must be getting quite plentiful on the Shook ranch. Dave says he counted nine in sight at one time in his meadow recently.

There is plenty of snow on the mountains north of the valley this year, and it is probable that Bear creek will be a very wide stream before long.

John Pool, of Olene has rented and removed with his family to the Marion Bennett place, now owned by Jasper Bennett, and will farm the coming summer.

Herbert Arrant has bought and moved onto the Chas. Bergdorf place in Pine Flat. Mr. Bergdorf talks of moving to Redding, Cal. In losing him the community loses a good honest citizen.

Numbers of farmers have been expecting to plow some this month, but if the weather don't change quite suddenly there will be no plowing in Yonna valley during this February.

Alternate showers of rain, flurries of snow and days of sunshine which melt the snow are having the effect of filling up the lakes and low places with a greater abundance of water than has been seen for years.

Theodore and Emil Flackps have exchanged residences for the coming year. Theodore bought Emil's place at the Flour Mill Spring and Emil has rented the former's homestead in the southeast part of the Valley.

Henry Meier, of Western Swan Lake valley, is figuring on putting in a telephone system for the use of some sixteen of his neighbors, also building a line into Klamath Falls and connecting with the Gates system there.

H. E. Crane of Klamath Falls, who is a frequent visitor in the valley, was an attendant at the Smyth party Friday evening. Dame Rumor has it that—but never mind. Rumors are not always reliable. Besides, he might object—and the other party might object too.

There was a dancing party of large proportions at the George Smyth ranch last Friday night, which is spoken of as a great success. A fine supper was partaken of by the guests at midnight, and the dancing continued until morning. It was probably the last party to be given during the season.

Henry E. Meier, who for many years has lived at the West side of Pine Flat, has bargained to sell his place to a man named Bockman of Round Rock, Texas. The purchase price is said to be \$1,600. Mr. Meier is quite aged and feeble, and is no longer able to care for himself. He is now living with his son, Henry.

That denunciatory resolution regarding Jacob Rueck, passed by the Board of Directors of the Water Users Association, was a very ungracious piece of business for men of affairs to consider and adopt. It seems to me, and sounds very like peanut politics. Besides, there was no occasion for it. Those men could have known, if they did not, that Mr. Rueck's business in Washington related entirely to the pushing of the Upper Project. It was very like stabbing a man in the back.

Mr. Mike Rueck, the eastside Valley farmer, met with an accident Friday afternoon last, resulting in the fracture of his leg in two places. He was returning home from Bonanza with two of his children behind him on his horse, bringing them home from school, when near the Kinsman place the animal slipped on the icy road and fell, throwing and falling upon him. He was carried to the Kinsman house and afterwards to his home, where the fractured bones were reset, and he is doing as well as possible. The children escaped injury.
