## SEVERAL OTHERS WANT THE JOB

### DISTRICT ATTORNEY CAMERON WANTS THAT OFFICE

#### Three of Portland's Citizens Think They Are Qualified, and Will Enter the Race

District Attorney Cameron of Portland may be a candidate for the Republican nomination for governor. He has as much as admitted the fact, though with the halting hesitancy of a girl who asks for more time to consider a proposal.

"It means a lot of work," he said, "and I am getting old. I have been urged by some of my friends to get in the race."

Mr. Cameron's term as district attorney will not expire until 1913, and though he should fall in his gubernatorial aspirations, he still would have his present position to fall back on. By reason of this it is reasoned by his friends he would continue to be active politically and defeat at this time would not endanger his chances when his term expires.

Already there are said to be eight candidates for the republican gubernatorial nomination. The contest promises to be lively, and probably will begin in earnest within a fortnight. All of those aspiring to this nomination, as well as other state officers, will, it is understood, seek the endorsement of the state republican assembly.

The report in the Oregonian recently of various candidates, both county and state, caused much comment in local political circles. Probably no other announcement created more general comment than that bearing on the congressional situation in the Second Oregon district. W. R. Ellis, present representative in congress, is promised a strong race. John F. Logan, a Portland attorney, and A. W. Lafferty, a young and coming lawyer, are both avowed candidates. Their announcements are authoritative. Mr. Lafferty is now in the East on business, where he has been since early in March. He will return home the latter part of this month. In letters to friends here he has confirmed the report of his intentions to be a candidate.

Those who it is understood will be candidates for governor, besides Mr. Cameron, are: Dr. Andrew C. Smith and State Food and Dairy Commissioner Bailey of Portland, Jay Bowerman of Condon, president of the state senate; Judge Stephen A. Lowell of Pendleton, State Superintendent of Public Instruction Ackerman, Dr. Jas. Withycombe of Corvallis and Judge Grant B. Dimick of Oregon City.

The formal call of Chairman George, of the state republican central committee, for county and state assemblies, is expected to be issued within the next few weeks. When it is formally issued, the dates for the various county assemblies will be fixed. Already, however, Coos and Baker counties have decided to hold their assemblies. In Multnomah county the assembly will be held July 19, one week after the county mass primaries for the selection of delegates to the assembly. The state assembly will be held July 21. Though two months yet remain until that time, as political matters go, that is not long, and the activities of candidates before the assembly no doubt will become marked more and more from now on.

The Klamath Tennis club is considering the advisability of holding its annual tennis tournament just prior to the big Fourth of July celebration, possibly on July 1st and 2d. From the present outlook the coming tennis tournament will be the biggest yet held in this city, and indications are that it will surpass the successful tournaments heretofore held.
