## THE WOMAN WITH THE BAG

Six lines of cablegram were sufficient to tell the world that Dr. Elizabeth Blackwell had died in London, and it is no wonder that the message did not mean much to the present generation, but Elizabeth Blackwell was the pioneer in the fight for the right of her sex to study and practice medicine. When sixty-five years ago she set about to do this so great was the prejudice against her on that account that she applied in vain for entrance to many medical colleges. After rebuffs at twenty institutions she at last was admitted to one in Geneva, N. Y., from which she was graduated in 1849.

But her troubles had only begun, for having graduated, she found herself socially ostracized and professionally boycotted. So strong was the feeling against her that she could not find boarding accommodations in New York city, and had actually to build her own house. Hospitals and dispensaries refused to admit her to practice there, and she was denounced by press and pulpit. This went on for years, but in 1854 she with her sister and another woman physician founded the first hospital for women in the country, getting most of their patients from among the poor. She also founded the Women's Medical college of New York, and when the civil war broke out she assisted in launching the Sanitary Aid association.

She was of the stuff of real heroines, and she paved the way for women to enter medicine, a profession now followed by thousands of them—many distinguished, trusted and efficient physicians. It is only the narrower minded of their brothers who now sneer at the woman with the little black bag.—Chicago Tribune.
