When sixty-five years ago she set about to do this so great U. was the prejudice against her on that account that she applied in vain for entrance to many medical colleges. After rebuffs at twenty institutions she at last was admitted to No. one in Geneva, N. Y., from which she was graduated in 1849.

But her troubles had only begun, for having graduated, she found herself socially ostracized and professionally boycotted. So strong was the feeling against her that she could not find boarding accommodations in Oregon New York city, and had actually to Oregon build her own house. Hospitals and dispensaries refused to admit her to Oregon. practice there, and she was denounced by press and pulpit. This went on for years, but in 1854 she with her 62-77 sister and another woman physician founded the first hospital for women in the country, getting most of their patients from among the poor.
