

# UNCLE SAM IS AFTER HOUSTON

IS NOW WANTED IN CHICAGO ON  
A CHARGE OF PERJURY

DEPUTY WILL ARRIVE THIS EVENING

Sheriff Receives a Telegram From  
United States District Attorney  
Sims of Chicago

Deputy United States Marshal Griffith is on his way to Klamath Falls, and will arrive here this evening, with him a warrant for the arrest of T. E. Yorke, or, as he is known here, F. B. Houston. The charge on which he is wanted by Uncle Sam is that of perjury. Sheriff Barnes has received a telegram from United States District Attorney Sims, requesting him to hold the prisoner, but this part of the instructions was unnecessary, as he is safe in the county jail and is likely to stay there for some time to come.

It is quite evident that the United States authorities are laboring under the impression that Houston is simply being held here to await the arrival of an officer to take him elsewhere. The mission of Deputy Marshal Griffith is doomed to failure, for Sheriff Barnes is not going to let Houston go unless he has to, and under present conditions he cannot surrender him to any one. Houston has been asked if he desired to have a hearing before a justice, and he informed the officials that he was in no hurry, that he was quite comfortable where he was and had nothing to spend but his time. Therefore, the fact that he has been held longer than twenty-four hours without a hearing will have no effect on his case, for he has stated that he did not want a hearing at this time. As the matter stands he is a prisoner of the state of Oregon, and under such conditions he will not be surrendered to anyone until this state is through with his case.

**Rural Delivery in South**  
Throughout the mountain districts of the South the mail is carried on horseback. The pouch is about five feet long, divided in two sections and opens in the middle. Half the mail is put in each side of the sack, and in this way it is carried on the horse's back.

In the rough mountain sections the work is anything but easy. Where there are no roads it is hard work, riding through storms, fording streams, climbing steep and rocky trails with almost perpendicular cliffs above and below. One misstep means death to horse and rider on the rocks below.

The postmaster is notified to have the mail ready by the tooting of the horn which every mail carrier carries. He blows the horn before he gets to the postoffice, as a signal to be ready for him, so that there will be no delay in making his trip on time.—Fur News.

1. The public notice of November 18, 1908, announcing the irri-gability of lands shown on the approved plats of the first unit of the Klamath project, Oregon-California, under the provisions of the Reclamation Act of June 17, 1902 (32 Stat., 388), provides that for lands thereafter entered the first installment of the charges for building, operation and maintenance shall be due at the time of entry, the second installment May 1, 1910, and subsequent installments on May 1 of following years; and that for lands in private ownership and for lands theretofore entered the first installment shall be due May 1, 1909, and subsequent installments annually on May 1 in following years.

2. The provisions of said notice are hereby affirmed. As to land in private ownership or lands theretofore entered all installments of the charges for building, operation and maintenance due on and after May 1, 1909, must be paid at the time of filing water right application therefor. All entries made hereafter for any of the lands shown on the approved plats of the said project, whether for lands not heretofore entered or for lands covered by prior entries which have been cancelled by relinquishment or otherwise, must be accompanied by applications for water rights in due form and by an amount equal to the sum of all unpaid (or paid and unassigned) installments for building, operation and maintenance which have become due for prior years, or which would have become due had the entry or water right application been made immediately after the public notice issued November 18, 1908, became effective.

3. The first and all subsequent installments of the charges for building, operation and maintenance for all irrigable areas shown on said plats shall accrue and be due and payable whether or not water right application is made for said lands or whether or not homestead entries under the provisions of the Reclamation Act are made thereon. Furthermore all water right applications and homestead entries made subsequent to the times and dates when one or more installments of the charges for building, operation and maintenance shall have accrued thereon, shall be subject to the payment of and be accompanied by all such prior installments as have thus accrued and remain due and unpaid.

4. The public notice of November 18, above referred to, is hereby amended by revoking the following provision, viz:
